of York; and also of the Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen, and Freeholders, affembled at the General Quarter Settions of the Peace held at the Borough of Rippon aforefaid, in and for his Grace the Lord Archbishop of York's Liberty of Rippon, &c. on Monday the 10th Day of April, in the 13th Year of your Majesty's Reign.

Most Gracious and Dread Sovereign,

AS the fecure and uninterrupted Enjoyment of our Religion and Laws, Liberty and Property (the Effect and Refult of your wife clement and aufpicious Government) juftly Claim the fincereft Acknowledgments, the moft dutiful and affectionate Returns from a generous and free People, to an indulgent, vigilant and beneficent Prince; fo the dark and malicious Schemes and open Attempts of your and confequently our Enemies, to deprive your facred Majefty of your precious Life and Crown, and us of the Blettings of your Reign, equally demand our keeneft Relentment, and provoke our higheft Indignation.

- When we observe a Prince, under innume-rable Obligations to you and the ftrongest Ties of Gratitude for those Obligations, against all publick and private Faith, and the most folemn Treaties, combining with a Power late his own but now your Enemy, to wreft from you and feize one of the most important of your Fortreiles, to depreis and divert our Trade and Commerce (that Source and Spring of all our Wealth and Power) and to obtrude upon us a Popish and abjured Pretender, (that Minion of Rome and Bane to our Conftitution) a Prince approaching by his Minister your Throne with Infolence, Falshood, and Calumny; we stand amazed and affected with the greatest Anger against him, and the warmest Zeal for your Honour and Safety. And we beg Leave to give your Majefty the ftrongest Allurances imaginable, that as we highly approve of the just and prudent Measures already taken for the discovering and disconcerting the deep and ambitious Intrigues of your Enemies, fo we will stand by, affift, and support your Majesty with all our Force, againlt them, till by your Counfels and Wildom, you fhall eftablish a Peace upon a folid and lasting Foundation, or by your Arms, in Conjunction with those of your Allies, compel them to fue for that Peace which their Ambition, Perfidy and Rashness have broken, and which, by their Malice, Impotence and Folly, they do not deferve.

And we farther beg Leave to affure your Majefty, that if there shall be found amongst us any Perfons to abandoned and devoid of Understanding, as to prefer the Dominion and promote the Interests of a Popish Tyrant, in Opposition to the merciful, wife, and regular Administration of a lawful King, we shall look upon them as Enemies to our Country, and endeavour to lead them by the Hand of Justice to a thorough Convicti-

on of their Folly, and a due Punishment for their Guilt.

That the God of all Knowledge and Power may direct your Counfels in Wildom, and Crown your Arms with Succefs; that your Reign may be long, profperous and happy over a loyal, obedient and free People; that there may never want a Protestant Hero of your illustrious House, emulous of your Virtues and formed by your Example, to sway the Scepter of these Realms, are the fervent Prayers and fincere Wishes of, Sir,

'To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Presbyterian Ministers and Gentlemen in the North of Ireland, in Behalf of themselves, and the People of their Perswasion.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

W E your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, do in all Humility beg Leave to renew our Acknowledgements of the many ineftimable Bleifings and Royal Favours we have enjoyed ever fince your Majefty's happy and feasonable Acceffion to the Imperial Throne of these Nations.

We regard your Majesty as the Father of your Country, and (under God) the great Preferver of our facred and civil Interests at Home, and of the Reformed Protestant Churches in all Parts of the World; and are therefore fo fenfible how much depends on the Prefervation of your Royal Perfon, and the Succeifion to the Crown in your illustrious House, that we cannot but look on the clandeftine Combinations of some foreign Powers, and their open Hostilities already begun against the unquestionable Rights of your Majesty, and the Trade and Prosperity of your People, contrary to the Faith of the most folemn Treaties and all Obligations of Gratitude, with a just Indignation and Resentment; nor shall we ever cease to offer up our most hearty Prayers to Almighty God, to render all Defigns form'd for the Difturbance or Overthrow of your Majesty's Government abortive.

If God, for our Sins, fhould ever fuffer fuch wicked Defigns to fucceed, these Nations must become a Scene of Blood and Confusion, and be in Time fubjected to the groffest Corruptions of Popery, and the most ignominious Slavery. But fince we have a Prince on the Throne, who makes it the principal
