We behold with the highest Satisfaction that Noble and truly British Spirit, that has fo feafonably revived in all Parts of your Dominions, upon the Difcovery made, thro' the Vigilance of your Majefty and your Mi-nifters, of a Secret Alliance formed abroad for invading your Kingdoms, and placing a Popifh Pretender on your Majefty's Throne. And we have a particular Pleasure in ob-ferving that this Spirit has been raised by those very Artifices, which, through the ill Judgment of your Majesty's Enemies, were calculated to produce a contrary Effect

on the Minds of your People. The wife and virtuous Part of Mankind must ever detest those dishonourable and ungrateful Attempts made by Powers once in Alliance with your Majesty, and who owe the quiet Possellion of their Crowns to the Affiftance of the Crown of Great Britain.

As we could not fit still, and forbear to

Lisbon, April 21, N.S. The 15th Inftant arrived here the Marquels de los Balbaies, Amballadour Extraordinary from his Catholick Majesty to this Court. He was received at the Water-fide and conducted to his Houfe by the Conde d'Ovidos, who was, by the King of Portugal deputed for that Purpofe. The 17th the faid Ambaffadour vilited the Secretary of State, and the Day after had a private Audience of their Portuguele Majefties. The 17th Inftant lailed from hence Nolla Senhora de Livramento, a rortuguese Man of War bound for Goa. M. Giddes, his Portuguele Majesty's Envoy at the Court of Madrid, being recalled; is expected here the End of next Week. On the 12th and 13th Instant arrived here the Ship Fisher Thomas Gates Mafter, and the Betty Galley commanded by James Norcom, each in three Days from Gibraltar. The Mafters report, that on the 7th Inftant the Torbay Man of War arrived there, with all the Tranfports and Store-Ships under her Convoy; that the Soldiers were all landed, and they were using the utmost Expedition in getting ashore the Artillery and Stores: That Sir Charles Wager was there, with his Squadron, except only two Sixty Gun Ships which were left to cruize off Cadiz; that all the Third Rates were taking in their Water in Hafte, the Admiral intending to hoift his Flag on board the Torbay, and return to Sea on the 11th Instant ; leaving four Fifty Gun Ships in the Bay, and two Sixth Rates on the Back of the Mountain, for the Afliftance of the Garrison, and for preventing all Communi-cation with the Spanish Army by Water. When these Masters came away, they had loft but 14 Men in the Place.
