A S we are truly fensible of your Majesty's tender Regard for the Welfare and Profperity of your Subjects, of the Care and Wisdom of your Ministers, and of the prudent Administration of your Majesty's Government in this Kingdom, we beg Leave to express our grateful Acknowledgments for these Blessings, and our utmost Abhorrence and Detestation of the Principles and Practices of those who endeavour to interrupt the Peace of your Government, and the Felicity we enjoy under your most auspicious Reign.

The Measures concerted by your Majesty for preserving the Peace of Europe against the Attempts of those Powers, who out of private Views, and in Violation of the highest Obligations, and most solemn Treaties, have invaded the Rights, and disturbed the Repose of your Majesty's Subjects and all their Neighbours, must convince the World, that you extend your Views not only to the Protection of your People, but to the Security of the common Interest of Mankind; and we assure ourselves, that the Power and prudent Disposition of your Majesty's Fleets, the Courage of your Troops, and the Vigilance of your Ministry, will render all Attempts of your Enemies abroad against the Liberties of Europe, as vain and ineffectual as those already made to place the Pretender on your Majesty's Throne.

While your Majesty is thus employed in the Desence of the Rights of your Allies, and the Protection of your Subjects, our Minds are filled with the greatest Indignation at the infamous Endeavours that have been made use of to asperse your Sacred Perfon; and we can't but look upon all luch Attempts as the low Arts and Contrivances of our Enemies (the only Means now left them) to withdraw the Affections of your Subjects, and to lessen that Confidence which your Allies so justly place in your Majesty, and thereby to defeat those Measures you the 29th Day of September, 1927. have taken for their Preservation.

We therefore beg Leave to affure your Ma: jesty, that we shall with the greatest Chearfulnels venture our Lives and Fortunes in Vindication of your Majesty's Honour, and in the Defence and Support of your Government, and of the Succession in your most illustrious Family, against all Attempts of your Enemies.
