And now when through the Ingratitude of two Princes, and their dangerous Alliances, War is become necellary for our Safety, what feafonable Preparations by Sea and Land, and by excellent Treaties and Alliances, have you not made? For which, and the many other your Majefty's paternal Cares of us, we do most folemnly and faithfully promi'e and affure your Ma-jefty to contribute chearfully and liberally to the Expences of your Majesty's Fleets, Armies, and all other Charges, and to use all other Means in our Power for the Safety of your Majesty's Ferson and Family, and Succellors in the Protestant Line, and the attaining an honourable and durable Peace.

We therefore, and in Confequence of our Allegiance, humbly beg of the Almighty to bles your Majesty's Undertakings, influence your Counfels, preferve your Perfon, and to make your Majefty and Pofterity every Way as happy as your Majefty may defire.

Must we not be declared a People infatuated, devoid of the Principle of Self-Prefervation, could we be imagined to be able to bear a Glimple of Thought without Horrour and Deteftation of exchanging the infinite Bleffings of your Reign for a -----? A Proteftant Indignation forbids us to

give it a Name !

Such must be the Refertments which arife in our Minds towards those Foreign Powers, who to difturb the happy Tranquility and flourishing State we enjoy, have broken thro' private and publick Faith, trampled under Foot the Ties of Honour, Gratitude and even good Manners, and in Violation of folemn Declarations and Treaties; but as your Majesty's wife Precautions have hitherto prevented their destructive Schemes, fo we may congratulate our felves on a full Confidence and Allurance that your Majefty's Care, Skill and Power will be Itill able to defeat them.

It is no Wonder that reftless Factions, actuated by the implacable Rancour of Popish Cabals, exasperated by Disappointment, forced to it by Bankruptcy, ihould still join with the vain impotent and desperate Hopes of a Popish Pretender, and his more desperate and attainted Adherents. - But fuch is their. Imbecility as to render it unworthy of our Fears : Such it must be, fince it has the Conduct of your Majesty, the Wildom of your Councils, the Vigilancy of your Ministers, the Laws and Statutes of your Realms, the Declarations and Refolutions of your Lords Spiritual and Temporal, supported by those of your faithful Commons in Parliament assembled, and the united Hands and Hearts of your Majesty's best Subjects, to oppose it.

Which we on our Parts declare and promife heartily and fincerely to do, and according to our respective Powers to fee done.

Whilft our Prayers to God shall be to fhower down in a peculiar Manner the choiceft of his Bleffings on your Majefty's Head, and that it may pleafe Him to be your Defender and Keeper, to give you Victory over all your Enemies, and at the last (very late) to crown you with His heavenly Glory.

To preferve and blefs your Royal Family, in their Royal Highneffes and their illustrious Islue, that the Inheritance of the Protestant Crowns of these Realms may remain and flourish on their Heads, and on those of their Posterity till Time shall be no more
