On their Part, they humbly beg Leave to offer their most ardent Wishes for your Majefty's Health and long Life ; and your Majefty may depend on the most fincere and hearty Endeavours in their Sphere for the Support of your Majelty and your Government; that they will be vigilant to confirm and eftablish the Zeal and Affections of your Majesty's Subjects, and do every thing in their Power that your Majesty's Reign may be prosperous and happy.

Paris, June 22; N. S. By an Express dispatched from the Duke de Kichelieu Amballadour from the molt Christian King at the Court of Vienna, we have received an Account, that the Preliminary Articles for a general Pacification, were figned there on the 13th Inftant by the Plenipotentiaries of the Emperour, France, Spain, and Holland : And, as Mr. Walpole the British Plenipoten= tiary (to supply the want of an Opportunity of figning in Form the faid Pleliminaries with a Plenipotentiary of the King of Spain,) had figued an Inftrument by Virtue of his full Powers obliging the King his Master to the Observance of the faid Preliminaries towards his Catholick Majesty, on Condition that the Duke de Bournonville the Spanish Plenipotentiary at Vienna should fign a like Inftrument obligatory on the King of Spain's Part ; the Duke de Bournonville did accordingly fign an Inftrument of the fame Te-nour, obliging the King his Mafter to the Observance of the faid Articles towards the King of Great Britain.
