**A**N Express having brought the News of the Decease of our late Sovereign Lord King George, of blessed Memory, the High and Mighty Prince, George Prince of Wales, was this Day proclaimed, with the usual Formalities, at the Market-Cross of this City, at the Gates of the Castle, and at the Abby of Holy-Rood-House, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland; at which Ceremony assisted a great many of the Nobility and Gentry of this Country who were then in Town.

*Whereas it hath pleased Almighty God to call to His Mercy our late Sovereign Lord King George, of Blessed Memory, by whose Decease the Imperial Crowns of Great-Britain, France and Ireland, are solely and rightfully come to the High and Mighty Prince, George Prince of Wales; And whereas the Lords Spiritual and Temporal of this Realm, assisted with those of His late Majesty's Privy-Council, with Numbers of other principal Gentlemen of Quality, with the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of London, did, by a Proclamation given at the Court of Leicester-House, the Fourteenth Day of June Instant, publish and proclaim, That the High and Mighty Prince, George Prince of Wales, is now, by the Death of our late Sovereign, of happy Memory, become our only lawful and rightful Liege Lord, George the Second, by the Grace of God, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c. And whereas, in Obedience to an Order of the Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, a Copy of the said Proclamation has been sent to the Lord Provost of Edinburgh, in order to Proclaim His Royal Majesty: Therefore, the Lord Provost, Magistrates and Town-Council of Edinburgh, assisted with Numbers of Noblemen and other principal Gentlemen of Quality, do now hereby, with one full Voice and Consent of Tongue and Heart, Publish and Proclaim,*

*That the High and Mighty Prince, George Prince of Wales, is now, by the Death of our late Sovereign of happy Memory, become our only lawful and rightful Liege Lord George the Second, by the Grace of God, King of Great Britain, France and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c. to whom we do acknowledge all Faith and constant Obedience, with all hearty and humble Affection; beseeching God, by whom Kings and Queens do reign, to bless the Royal King George the Second, with long and happy Years to reign over us. Given at Edinburgh, the Nineteenth Day of June, 1727.*

Letters from Madrid of the 20th of June, N. S. advise, that the King of Spain having received from Paris an Account of the signing of the Preliminary Articles for a general Pacification the 31st of May, had ordered the Marquês de la Paz, his Secretary of State, to dispatch a Courier to the Count de las Torres, to command him to forbear all further Hostilities against Gibraltar: And by the same Courier the Dutch Minister at Madrid M. Van der Meer, wrote a Letter to the Earl of Portmore, acquainting him that he had had an Account from Mr. Walpole His Majesty's Ambassador, of the signing of the said Articles.

This Day the following Signification in Writing under the Hand of the Right Honourable Sir Spencer Compton, Knight of the most Honourable Order of the Bath and Speaker of the Honourable House of Commons, was affixed upon the Royal Exchange

in London, which is also directed to be inserted in the London Gazette by the several Acts of Parliament for that Purpose. viz.

Pursuant to an Order of the Honourable House of Commons made the Seventh Day of March 1726, I do hereby signify, that the said House of Commons did on the said Seventh Day of March 1726, come to the following Resolution, viz.

*Resolved,* That the Annuities after the Rate of Four Pounds per Cent. per Annum, payable for or on the several funding Orders made or to be made, for or in respect of the several Army Debentures certified since the 21st Day of March 1719, and charged on the General Fund, pursuant to the several Acts of Parliament for that Purpose, be redeemed and paid off.
