Confort, you may reign in the Hearts of all ur Subjects, and in your Royal Iffue may sign from one Generation to another; and that all Manner of Bleffings may be multiplied on the Houfe, Perfon and Administration of your facred Majefty.

## Thank you for this Loyal and Affectionate Address. You may be assured of my Protection, and of my Care and Attention to Support the Protestant Interest.
