And we assure ourfelves, that Religion will flourish under your Majesty and your Royal Confort, fo eminently diftinguished by a glo-rious Zeal for the Protestant Faith.

We now look down upon Pofferity with Comfort, from the certain Hopes of the fame Bleffings being perpetuated to them by your Royal Iffue, educated under fuch bright Examples of every Princely Virtue.

The following humble Address of the Bifhop, the Dean and Chapter of the Cathe-dral Church, and Clergy of the Diocefe of Briffol, has been prefented to His Majefty by the Right Reverend Father in God the Lord Bishop of that Diocefe, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Albemarle, Lord of the Bedchamber to His Majesty in waiting. Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very gracioufly.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

Most Gracious Sovereign, WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Bifhop, the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church, and Cler-gy of the Diocefe of Briftol, beg Leave to partake with your Majefty in your Grief for the Death of our late most gracious Sovereign your Royal Father; a Death, which at this Time must have been attended with the utmost ill Consequence to the Welfare of this Nation, and the Tranquility of Europe, if the Lofs had not been fully repaired by your Majefty's happy and peaceable Acceffion to the Throne of your Anceftors.

This certainly must make the deepest Impression of Fidelity and Gratitude on the Hearts of all her Sons, who have a true and just Regard to our Civil and Religious Rights.

When we further confider that this great Bleffing is ftill enhanc'd by the exemplary Piety of a good and gracious Queen, fo well affected to our excellent Constitution in Church and State, and that it is like to be continued to us and our Pofferity by a numerous flourishing Royal Islue, piously educated in the fame Principles; what remains for us to wish and pray, but that God (by whom Kings and Queens reign) would be pleafed long to preferve your Majefty's facred Peifon, your Royal Confort, and all your Royal Family; and earneftly to implore, that there may never be wanting one of your Majefty's illustrious Protestant Line to fill the British Throne, and to transmit to our latest Posterity our Reli-gion, Laws and Liberties, those inestimable Blessings which we now so happily enjoy under your Majesty's auspicious Government.
