HE following humble Address of the High-Sheriff, Juffices of the Peace, Grand-Jury, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Deyon, affembled at the Affizes held at the Caftle of Exon, August 2, 1727. has been presented to His Majesty by the Right Honourable the Lord King I.ord High Chancellour of Great Britain. Which Address His Majesty was pleafed to receive very gracioufly.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

May it pleafe your Majefly, Though the fudden and furprizing Lofs of your Royal Father could not but be Matter of great Sorrow and Concern to us and all his loyal Subjects, yet when we turn our Eyes, and look up to your Majesty, by Divine Providence immediately advanced to the Throne, without the leaft Difturbance, amidft the general Acclamations of your Peo-ple; we cannot but joyn our Hearts and Voices in the publick Congratulations, and at the fame Time wifth your Majefty, and pro-mife ourfelves, all Joy and Satisfaction from your auspicious Reign.

For what may we not promife ourfelves. for what may we not promite outerves from a King, who has given the World fo early Proof of his perfonal Courage in the Defence of the Protestant Religion, and our own Nation fo many Marks of his Wisdom and good Conduct in his more private Capacity; and who, fince his Accellion to the Throne, has added to all the' reft his Royal Word and Affurance of his fixed Refolution, by all poffible Means, to merit the Love and Affection of his People; and that it shall be his constant Care to preferve the Constituti-on in Church and State inviolable in all its Parts; and to feedre to all, his Subjects the full Enjoyment of their Religious and Civil Rights.

Upon these good Foundations we may just-ly assure ourselves, that the Protestant Religion fhall gain Ground; that the Church thall be protected and encouraged; our Trade, which has met with fome Obfiruction from the Profpect of an approaching War, fhall flourish and encrease: That Gibraltar, which has derived fuch Glory upon a former Reign, when it was taken; and upon that of your Royal Father, when it was defended with to

great Bravery; fhall not be very readily fur, rendred in this of your Majesty: But both that and Port Mahon, in which two Places of Importance our large and trading County is par-ticularly concerned, fhall be effectually fecured to us and our Posterity; and that your Majefty fhall be a Terror to your Enemies, and a Support to your Friends.

These our Hopes from your Majesty re-ceive no small Addition from your being blef-fed in such a Royal Confort, who has given ample Testimony of her fincere Affection for the Protestant Réligion, in preferring it to the immediate Prospect of a Crown; whole Prudence and Goodnefs, whole Courtefy and Condefcention, and all other princely Ver-tues, cannot fail of great Influence in pro-moting fuch Ends as are truly Glorious and Great, Honourable and Advantageous, in filling the Hearts of all your Subjects with generous Refentments of Gratitude and Loyalty, and obliging them with the ftrongest and

moft engaging Ties of Duty and Intereft. Happy in fuch a Royal Confort, in fuch a numerous Iffue, and in the Affections of your People, joined with your own perfonal Me-rit; what is there that the molt loyal Heart can wifh your Majefty in this World ? but a long Continuance of these Blellings, towards which we shall not fail to contribute our hearty Prayers and best Endeavours.
