to give their Attendance for the exhibiting of happy Conflicution both in Church and State, their Petitions and Claims concerning their Services before-mentioned to be done and performed at our faid Coronation. And We do herevy fignify unto all and every our Subjects, whom it may concern, That our Will and Pleasure is, and We do hereby strictly charge and command all Perfons, of what Rank or Quality scever they be, who either, upon our Letters to them directed, or by reason of their Offices, or Tenures, or otherwife, are to do any Service at the faid Day or Time of our Coronaticn, that they do duly give their At-tendance accordingly, in all Respects furnished and appointed, as to so great a Solemnity appertaineth, and answerable to the Dignities and Plaes which every one of them respectively holdeth and enjoyeth; and of this they or any of them are not to fail, as they will anfiver the contrary at their Perils, unlefs upon fpecial Reafons, by our Self under our Hand to be allowed, We shall dispense with any of their Services or Attendances.
