HIS Majesty's Birth-Day, which was on the 30th past, was this Day celebrated at Court. At Noon His Majesty received the Compliments of the Nobility, foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction. At Night there was a Ball. The Appearance was at both Times very numerous, and extremely splendid. On this Occasion the Guns in the Park and at the Tower were fired, and in the Evening there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

The following Address having been transmitted to his Excellency the Lord Carteret Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, has by him been presented to His Majesty, who was pleased to receive it very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Sovereign, Burgesses, Principal Inhabitants, and Freemen of Belfast.

May it please your Majesty,

WE humbly beg Leave to express our Sense of the Part we bore in the deep and universal Grief which at first seized the Minds of all your faithful Subjects, upon the Demise of your Royal Father our late most gracious Sovereign; a Grief which is no more than a just Tribute due to the glorious Memory of so excellent a Prince, whose peaceable Accession to the Throne; in a critical Conjunction never to be forgot by such as value the Liberties of a free People, was the blessed First Fruits of the Protestant Succession in your most august Family; the Settlement of which we value the more; for its being built on those just and honourable Principles upon which the late happy Revolution was effected; and for its having been chiefly procured by the unwearied Care and Zeal of our late glorious Deliverer (under God) from Popery and Slavery, the Great King William, of immortal Memory. To your Royal Father's Conduct we owe the speedy Suppression of an early and unnatural Rebellion; he re-established our Peace, secured our Religious and Civil Rights, reigned in the Affections of all good Subjects at Home, and restor'd the British Monarchy to a just Reputation and powerful Influence Abroad. To his vigilant Care, wise Counsels, and steady Management, Europe owes its present Prospect of a solid and lasting Peace, and your Subjects the Security of their Trade and Commerce.

We want Words to express the extream Joy and Satisfaction we are blest with in your Majesty's rightful Succession to the Imperial Crown of your Royal Ancestors. With the utmost Pleasure we recall into our Thoughts the early and clear Indications that appeared in your Majesty of a true Greatness of Mind, in your intrepid Bravery in the Field, employ'd in the best of Causes, the Defence of the Protestant Religion, and of the Liberties of Mankind; and in your being perfectly acquainted with all the wise and just Maxims of Government, discovered in your prudent and gracious Administration as Guardian of these Kingdoms in his late Majesty's Absence. We rejoice to find in your Majesty a Conjunction, as rare as it is happy, of all the Royal Virtues of King William the Third, and King George the First, the two greatest and best Kings that ever sway'd the British Sceptre before you. Like them you have commenced your auspicious Reign, by gracious Declarations of your tender Concern for the Happiness of your People; but with this Advantage, peculiar to your Majesty, that you are placed on the Throne, after a close Application for many Years to the Knowledge of the British Constitutions, Laws and Liberties, Interest and People, of which your Majesty has acquired that clear and perfect Understanding, which hath put it as fully in your Power, as it is agreeable to your great and generous Inclination, to govern with consummate Wisdom, impartial Justice, and Royal Clemency.

And it heightens, if possible, the Hopes we have justly conceived of the future Glories and Felicity of your Reign, that our most gracious Queen is adorned with such illustrious Vertues as must have conveyed true Majesty, and render'd it inseparable from so great and so beautiful a Character, even though she had never been dignified with Royal Honours; Things which appeared poor and contemptible to her pious Mind, when offer'd her at the Expence of Protestant Principles and a good Conscience, and which Heaven hath now blest her with as the Reward of her inviolable Attachment to the Interest of true Religion. We can't but regard your Majesty's hopeful and numerous Royal Issue as the visible Pledges of a kind and indulgent Providence, for transmitting to our latest Posterity the inestimable Blessings of the Protestant Religion, and of our Laws and Liberties.

We earnestly beseech your Majesty to accept of this humble Tender of our most dutiful and loyal Affection to your sacred Person and Government, and to be assured of our unshaken Fidelity and firmest Resolutions, in our several Stations and Capacities, to pay you the Allegiance due to our dread Sovereign, to maintain the Royal Dignity, just Rights and Honours of your Government, and the Protestant Succession, as established by Law, in your Royal Family; having nothing more at Heart, than that the Crown may sit easy, and may very, very long flourish on your Royal Head with all possible Lustre and Glory, and with all possible Blessings on
