To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Rof-comon, at an Affize held in and for the faid County, the 17th of August 1727.

Most Gracious Sovereign, As the Loss of your Royal Father our late gracious Sovereign, of ever blessed Memory, must fill the Hearts of all your loyal Subjects with the deepest Concern and Sorrow; the Blessing bestowed upon us by your Maiesty's peaceable and beauty Accounts. Majesty's peaceable and happy Accession to the Throne of your Ancestors, not only afleviates that Sorrow, but fills our Hearts with

Give us Leave to assure your Majesty, that as we in this Kingdom have on all Occasions diffinguished ourselves in our Zeal for the Succession in your illustrious Family, and are sensible it must be our own Fault if we are not the happiest People under so gracious a Sovereign, blessed with a Royal Consort, the Glory and Ornament of her Sex; we will on all Occasions readily facrifice our Lives and Fortunes to support and defend your Majesty against all your open and secret Enemies.

That your Majesty may long reign over us, and that the British Throne may never want a Successor from your Royal Line to secure to latest Times the Felicity of the present, shall be ever our fincere and conftant Prayers.
