Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Portriff, Free Burgeses, and Commonalty of this your ancient and loyal Borough of Tulsk, do in the humblest Manner beg Leave to joyne with your Majesty in our unfeigned Sorrow for the Death of our late most gracious Sovereign your Majesty's Royal Father, who had so highly endeared himself to these Nations by the most prudent and equal Government that hath been known in any Age.

It is however Matter of the greatest Consolation to us under this Affliction, to see the manifold Felicities derived by him upon these Kingdoms, so effectually secured to us after his Death, by your Majesty's most happy Accession to the Throne of your Royal Ancestors; upon which Occasion we beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty in the sincerest and most hearty Manner, and humbly to return our Thanks for the gracious Declaration you have been pleased to make of your Affection for the established Religion, Laws and Constitution of these Realms.

Nor can we omit this Opportunity of remembering in the most grateful Manner, that further Increase of our Happiness, arising from the Experience we have already had of your Majesty's most extensive Wisdom and Goodness; which gives us the fullest Assurance, that the Welfare and Prosperity of all your loyal Subjects will be the constant Rule and Measure of your Government. In Return whereof, we do with all Humility assure your Majesty, that we shall upon every Occasion stand by and support, to the utmost of our Power, your Majesty's most rightful and undoubted Title to the Imperial Crown of these Realms; earnestly beseeching God, that the same may flourish long on your Majesty's Head, for the Happiness of your People, and the Advancement of our most holy Religion.
