THE following Address having been transmitted to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has by him been presented to His Majesty. Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To His most Excellent Majesty King George the Second,

The humble Address of the President and Fellows of Harvard College in Cambridge in New-England.

May it please your Majesty,

SMALL and unknown as we are, in respect of the great and famous Universities which adorn the Kingdoms of Great Britain, yet none of them can boast a more united Heart, or a more constant and fervent Zeal for the Protestant Succession in your Majesty's Person, and in your most serene and illustrious House, than this your Majesty's loyal and humble College in New-England.

We come sad into the Royal Presence, and late among the Train of Mourners, coming from a far distant Part of your Majesty's Dominions, to pour our dutiful Tears over the Grave of the Great King your Father, our late Sovereign, of glorious Memory: But we bring Hearts full of Joy in your Majesty's peaceful Accession to the Throne over us; beseeching the most High God to make your Throne greater, and your Reign a greater Blessing to the Nations, than that of the most glorious of your Predecessors.

Our Fathers were some of the old Puritans, so called from their purer Church State, and Way of Worship, and Manner of Godly Discipline, which in their Apprehension they sought and practised. To their immortal Honour it must be remember'd and recorded, that as they sought a quiet Seat and Retirement for themselves and their Posterity in the Deserts of America; so they were likewise animated with a Prospect of enlarging the English Empire in Regions not known to former Ages. And as under the Encouragement of Royal Charters granted them, they

cheerfully planted and subdued a vast Wilderness at their own Expence, and not without many Hardships and Hazards; so Religion was always their first and chief Care; and in order to that, Learning; in this they were singular among the Provinces, and we their Posterity reap the Honour and happy Fruits of it.

In one of their first Towns they planted a Seminary for Learning, and called it by the worthy Name of Cambridge. In this College are taught the Learned Languages, the Liberal Arts and Sciences unto this Day; and from it our many Churches have, through the Favour of God, been supplied with Pastors; and the highest Chairs of Honour among us have been sometimes laudably filled, to the Service of the King, and the Good of the Country.

Nothing but Learning and good Morals are here required to qualify Persons for the Honours and Favours of the House, but they are equally dispens'd unto Protestants of all Perswasions.

The Principles of Loyalty and Religion are here taught and instill'd into our Youth; and our many Churches are at this Day famous for their Zeal for the true Protestant Religion, according to the Doctrinal Articles of the Church of England; which Divine Truths we see with Joy secured to us in your Majesty's Possession of the Throne of your Ancestors.

Our Prayer therefore to the King's most Excellent Majesty is, That our Churches, and this College, which God has made the singular Ornament and Blessing of our Country, may ever have your Majesty's Royal Favour and Protection; and also may find Grace in the Eyes of her Majesty your Royal Consort, who, with her Royal Offspring are to us as the Light of our Eyes, and the Breath of our Nostrials.

That your Majesty may long live and reign in the Hearts of all your Subjects, and at last in Life by Jesus Christ, is the hearty Prayer of.

The following humble Address of the Justices of the Peace of the County of Aberdeen, met at Aberdeen the 22d of September 1727, has been presented to His Majesty by Sir Peter Fraiser, introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Deloraine Lord of the Bedchamber to His Majesty in waiting. Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,
May it please your Majesty,

Permit us, Great Sir, amongst the rest of your loyal Subjects, who by their numerous Addresses from all Parts of your Kingdoms do express their deep Concern they and we have for the Death of your Royal Father; at the same Time the Joy all your faithful Subjects have, to behold a Prince upon the Throne, not only endued with all Christian and moral Virtues, but one that has had long the Benefit of the wise Example of your Royal Father, and who has assisted with much Honour and Distinction in the august Senate of Britain, that holds under God the Fate of Europe in their Hands; an Advantage for your Glory and the Happiness of your Subjects, that few Successors to these Realms has ever had; This great Felicity your Majesty has, in respect to the Experience you have got in that School of Knowledge, promises to us and all your Subjects a Reign adorned with all human Blessings, attended with a wise Oeconomy of your vast Revenues, the true Sinsews of War.

When we consider the Steps that has brought your illustrious Family to the Throne of Britain, and overturned the pernicious Schemes of a late Ministry, we must own it's a superior Power has given your Kingdoms the Felicity they enjoy under your auspicious Reign; to which, it seems, you was called by a Voice from Heaven, that commanded the Assent of Men.

To whom, great Sir, should we more naturally offer our Duty and Allegiance, than to a King, that besides the excellent Qualities you possess, is established on the Throne according to the ancient Constitution; and has in your Person and Royal Progeny, not only the British, but the Saxon Blood of the Kings of England.

Your Gracious Assurance to your Subjects in preserving the Constitution in Church and State, is what we firmly believe from your Royal Word; nor can we ever doubt of it, when we remember the heroic Actions of your Ancestors, who among the first did draw their conquering Swords in Defence of our Holy Religion, and the Protestant Interest; and at last struggling in that glorious Cause, exchanged an earthly for a celestial Crown; for this Providence has given you the British but for a just Reward.

Though we have not the Honour that your Majesty was born in this Island, yet we receive in you but what we lent to your native Country, in the Persons of two Princesses, the one the fruitful Mother of an Emperour and ma-

ny Princes, the other the Ornament of Europe and her own Sex.

We have no more to add but our Wishes That the Almighty God may give you Prosperity and Health; that your Arms and those of your High Allies may still be successful, and carry Victories and Blenheims where-ever they come.
