picious Practices, and the Publishers of leud. vrofane, and blafphemous Books) doth still prevail among us, and is no lefs dangerous to the prefent Peace and Tranquility of your Government, than it is difpleafing to Al-mighty God, and deftructive to the Souls of Men. It will be your Majesty's Honour, the Glory of your Reign, to put a Stop to these bold and impious Attempts ; and by making us a virtuous and religious, to render us a happy and flourishing Nation.

The bright Examples which shine forth in your Royal Family, and frike the Hearts of your Subjects with Love and Admiration, cunnot but add the greateft Weight to your Majefty's good Delires and Endeavours; whilit they observe, with the highest Satisfaction, that what your Majeity requires of your People, is in Effect to follow the Examples of that Piety in their own Conduct, which they there behold with fo much Pleafure and Veneration.

We beg Leave to affure your Majefty, that we will, in our leveral Stations, employ our utmost Endeavours to excite all those who are committed to our Charge, to be zealous in their Duty to God, and Loyalty to your Majefty. And as we are fecure of your Ma-jefty's Care and Conern for the Welfare of your l'eople, to exhort them with all Earnestness, by a constant and conscientious Obedience to your Majesty, and a quiet and peaceable Behaviour towards one another, to contribute what in them lies to make your Reign happy; their highest Interest, as well as Duty.

It is with the greatest Satisfaction that we congratulate your Majesty upon the Hope you have been pleafed to communicate to your Parliament, that your Endeavours to put an End to the Troubles and Diforders of Europe, by a general Pacification, are likely to meet with the defired Success : This will render your Majefty ftill more honoured abroad, and beloved at home.

May the good God profper all your Ma-jefty's Endeavours for the publick Welfare, and give your Subjects fuch a true Senfe of the Bleffings they enjoy under your Government, that they may be as zealous by their Unanimity and Vigour, to make your Ma-jefty a great and glorious Prince, as your Majefty is, by your tender and paternal Care, to make them a flourishing and happy People.

THIS publick Testimony of your Duty and Fidelity, and the sealous Concern you express for the Support and Honour of my Government, are very acceptable to me : And you may be affured, that I shall always main-tain the Conjutution of the Church of England, as by Law established; and shall be ready to do my Part towards a vigourous Execution of the Laws against Blasphemy, Profanenefs, and Immorality.
