Dread Sovereign,

WE your Majesty's loyal and dutiful Subjects, most heartily condole your Majesty on the Death of our late Sovereign (your Royal Father of glorious Memory); at this Juncture cannot sufficiently express the Happiness we shall enjoy in a succeeding Monarch, endowed with such excellent Perfections, which (with much Satisfaction we profess) fills the Hearts of all true Britons with Joy, Transport and Admiration.

May your Majesty and Royal Consort long live to reign over us, and continue to encrease your Royal Family for the Happiness of your People, and for the Maintenance and Support of our Laws, Religion, and true Virtue.
