Ulm, April 18, N. S.

THE Lord Waldegrave arrived here last Night, and this Morning received the Compliments of the Magistrates of the Town. His Lordship imbars this Afternoon, and proposes to be at Vienna in six Days.

St. James's, April 22.

This Day the Marquess Rangoni, First Minister of State and Envoy Extraordinary of the Duke of Modena, had his first private Audience of His Majesty, to which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Mr. Inglis Assistant Master of the Ceremonies, in the Absence of Sir Clement Cottrell Master of the Ceremonies.

The same Day he had his first private Audience of Her Majesty in Her Apartment, to which he was introduced by Mr. Vice-Chamberlain Smith, and conducted by Mr. Inglis.

He had afterwards an Audience of His Royal Highness the Duke in his Apartment, to which he was conducted by Mr. Inglis.
