Hisday His Majelty, in Councel was pleased to Or-der his Proclamation to be issued, to this effect; That all Protections what sover heretofore granted, whereby the Seamen or Mariners ferving in an | Merchants Ship, or in the Ship of any Privaany Merchants Ship, or in the Ship of any Privateer, are exempted, or may pretend to be exempted from being preft and taken into the Service of His Majeflies, Fleet, Thall ceafe, and are abfolutel, determined and recalled, Neverthelels, it shall be lawful for any Merchants Ship, or Ship belonging to any Privateer, to be Navigated b, such Fotreign Seamen and Mariners as they can procured, without having any such Forreign Seamen taken from them, upon any pretence whatsoever, but all Seamen and Mariners, who are His Majeflies Natural born Subjects, and shall be found in any such Ships. That he raken from themes, and disposed of in any fuch Ships, thay be taken from thence, and disposed of in His Majesties Fleet, any former Protection to the constant notwithstanding. And all Metchants Ships and Privateers not in His Majelties Fleer, any former Protection to the company now, ithitanding. And all Metchants Ships and Privateers not Navigated with Forreigners as aforefaid, are reftrained from going so Sea. And because divers Seamen and Mariners present to render themselves to His Majesties Service, by going on board several of His Majesties Ships, and there procure a Passor Ticket from the Chief Officers of such Ships, licensing them to go and continue on shoard for a few days upon their private oxcassons, and when by pretence of such Passor Tickets they have escaped the Press, withdraw themselves, and do not return to His Majesties Ships as the time appointed; Therefore His Majest, dock Declare, that no such Passor Tickets shall be allowed or admitted, to excuse an Beaman of Mariner, Trombellig pressed into the Service of His Majesties Fleet, unless such Seaman or Mariner, producing such Passor Ticket, shall be found in the Company of, and be owned by some Officer of the Ship, to which the said Ticket expresses him to belong, who will be responsable for his forthcoming.
