ON the 22d Instant, being the Anniversary of His Britannick Majesty's Succession to the Crown, the Earl of Chesterfield gave a splendid Entertainment to all the Foreign Ministers, and the chief Persons here. On the 24th arrived from Brussels Don Louis d'Acunha, to reside here as Minister of the King of Portugal, in the Room of M. Mendoza, who will soon set out for Lisbon. On the 25th the Lord Glenorchy proceeded from hence for Copenhagen. M. Hurgrogne, one of the Plenipotentiaries of this Republick for the Congress at Soissons, is arrived from Zealand, and will forthwith proceed to Soissons. On the 25th Instant the Baron de Hompesch, Nephew of General Hompesch, was introduced by M. de Boetselaar (who is Father in Law of the said Baron) into the College of Nobility of Holland and West-Friseland, was entered in their Register, and received by them as one of the Nobles; and accordingly took his Place among the States of the said Province, who are now assembled here.

General Post-Office, June 19, 1728.

These are to give Notice, That the Post will go every Night, Sundays excepted, from London to Tunbridge, and from Tunbridge Walls to London, from Wednesday the 26th of this Instant June, during the Summer Season, as usual.

General Post Office, June 25, 1728.

Whereas by the Act of Parliament of the 9th of Queen Anne, for establishing a General Post Office, it is amongst other things enacted, That no Person or Persons whatsoever shall have the carrying and delivering of any Letters whatsoever, unless such Persons only as shall be authorized thereunto by the Postmaster General, under the Penalty of Five Pounds for every several Offence against the Tenor of the said Act, one Moiety thereof to the King, and the other Moiety to the Person who shall sue for the same, with full Costs of Suit; Yet notwithstanding, it is found that Letters are frequently carried and delivered by Persons who are not authorized thereunto, but by some illegal Means possess themselves of Letters which should have passed through the General Post Office, and in particular Ship Letters, and to make an Advantage to themselves, demand Money for the Post of such Letters, and sometimes by counterfeiting the Marks of the Office exact more than the legal Post would come to had they been regularly taxed in the Office. To prevent therefore as much as possible this clandestine manner of carrying and delivering of Letters, which is very prejudicial to the Subject in many Respects, and also a Loss to His Majesty's Revenue,

It is ordered by the Postmaster General, That every Letter Carrier whose Walk is within London, Westminster, or Southwark, shall, as a Badge of his Employ-

ment, wear a Brass Ticket upon some (the most visible) Part of his Cloathing, with the King's Arms upon it; which Ticket he is always to wear whilst he is upon Duty.

And all Persons who shall discover any Letter Carrier, Porter, or other Person or Persons whatsoever, delivering Letters which should have passed through the General Post Office without such Badge or Ticket upon the most visible Part of their Cloathing, are desired to give Information thereof to the Postmaster General, that the Offenders may be prosecuted according to Law; and for such Information they shall meet with all fitting Encouragement.

Aldersgate Ward, Farringdon without, Bishopsgate without, Port-loaken Ward, and Tower Liberty within.

Friday July 5.

All Southwark, and all within the Weekly Bills on that Side of the Water.

The Parishes of St. Botolph Aldgate, St. Catherine's, St. John Wapping, and St. Paul Shadwell, the Hamlets of Wapping Stepney, Ratcliff, Limchoufe, Poplar and Blackwall.
