#### From Saturday June 29. to Auesday July 2. 1728.

#### Whitehall, June 29.

**THIS** Day their Majefties went from Richmond to Black-Heath, where the Queen's Royal Regiment of Foot commanded by Brigadier Piercy Kirke, and the Regiment of Foot commanded by Collonel Henry Harrifon; passed in Review before His Majesty, and made a very fine Appearance. After which, their Majefties returned to Richmond.

### Whitehall, July 2.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Sir Walter Yonge, Sir John Evelyn, Sir John Stanley, Thomas Walker, Efq; Sir Charles Peers, Sir James Campbell, Humphry Brent, John Campbell, Brian Fairfax, Henry Hale, George Drummond, John Hill, Allan Bro-derick, and Gwynn Vaughan, Efqrs. to be Commissioners of the Customs.

Whitehall, July 2, 1728. Whereas Jane the Wife of George Sherwing, and Jane their Daughter, of Waterstone, in the Parish of Piddletowne, in the County of Dorfet, were on the 22d Day of April 1727, at Night, barbarously murdered in or near the Dwelling House of the said George Shir-wing; His Majesty is pleased for the Discovery of the Persons concerned in the said Murder, to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of the faid Criminals (except the Perfon or Perfons who actually committed the faid Murder) who fhall discover his Accomplices, fo that they or any of them be apprchended and Holles Newcaftle. convicted thereof.

Westminster st. A General Dedimus Potestatem is isfued forth under the Great Seal, impowering the Clerk of the Peace of the Liberty of Westminster, or his Deputy, to administer the Oaths of Office, and Alle-giance and Supremacy, to every Justice of the Peace for the faid Liberty who was a Justice of the Peace of his late Majesty King George at the Time of his Decease, and bath by any Commifion granted by bis prefent Majelty before the 13th of February last been continued a Justice of the Peace of the faid Liberty. Note, By an Act of the last Session of Parliament, all

Persons who were Justices of the Peace at the Demise of his faid late Majelty, and have been continued Justices bis jaia late Majelty, and bave been continued justices of the Peace, and who fince the 1 1th Day of June 1727, have taken the Oath of Office of a Justice of the Peace, or shall take such Oath of Office before the 28th Day of November wext, shall be and are indempnified and discharged for or in Respect of all Acts and Matters done or to be done by them as Justices of the Peace.

And that all fuch Justices as have fince the faid 11th Day of June 1727, taken the Sacrament, and Oaths, and fubscribed the Test required by Law, are not obli-ged to qualify themselves again in respect of their Of-fice of Justices.

For Payment of the King's Rents in the Isle of Wight.

An Audit will be held by the King's Officer appointed for that Purpose, on Saturday the 20th of July Instant, in the Forenoon, at the George Inn at Newport, in the faid 1717; at which Time and Place, all Perfons paying Rents to His Majesty for Lands, &c. within the faid Ifle, or their Under-Tenants, are to pay or cause to be

paid one Year's Rent due at Lady-Day last, which will prevent Trouble and Gharge.

#### Office for Licenfing Hawkers and Pedlars.

The Commillioners do hereby give Notice, that daily Attendance is given at their Office abovelaid, (Sundays and Holidays excepted) from Nine a Clock in the Mor ning till Twelve, and from Two till Five in the Af-ternoon, in order for the delivering out yearly Licenfer, as usual.

And all Perfons who fhall be found trading as Hawkers, Pedlars, or Petty Chapmen, without Licenfes for fo doing, will be profecuted for the Twelve Pound Penalty as the Law directs.

And whereas feveral Perfons do prefume to go from House to House with divers Goods liable to the Act, and do in fuch Houfe or Houfes prevately fell or expose to Sale fuch Goods without any Licenfes, pretending that they only call upon their Customers, and carry fuch Goods with them as are befpoke; thele are to give Notice, that there is no Provision made in any of the AEIs to justify any Person or Persons fo trading without Licenfes, but fuch Perfon or Perfons fo trading are fub-jett to the Penalty above-mentioned.

General Post Office, June 25, 1728. Whereas by the AE of Parliament of the 9th of Queen Anne, for establishing a General Post Office, it is amongst other things enacted, That no Person or Perfons whatfoever shall have the carrying and delivering of any Letters whatfoever, unlefs fuch Perfons only as shall be authorized thereunto by the Pofimafter General, under the Penalty of Five Pounds for every feveral Offence against the Tenor of the faid Act, one Moiety thereof to the King, and the other Moiety to the Person who shall fue for the same, with full Costs of Suit; res notwithflanding, it is found that Letters are frequently carried and delivered by Perfons who are not authorized thereanto, but by some illegal Means posses thems lives of Letters which fould have paffed through the Gene-ral Post Office, and in particular Ship Letters, and to make an Advantage to themfelves, demand Money for the Port of Juch Letters, and fometimes by counterfeiting the Marks of the Office exact more than the legal Port would come to had they been regularly taxed in the Office. To prevent therefore as much as poffible this clandestine manner of carrying and delivering of Lecters, which is very prejudicial to the Subject in many Respects, and also a Loss to His Majesty's Revenue,

It is ordered by the Poltmaster General, That every. Letter Carrier whose Walk is within London, Westminfler, or Southwark, Shall. as a Badge of bis Employ-ment, wear a Brajs Ticket upon fome (the most vijible) Part of his Cloathing, with the King's Arms upon it. which Ticket he is always to wear whilf he is upon Duty.

And all Perfons who fhall discover any Letter Carrier, Porter, or other Person or Persons what sever, delivering Letters which should have passed through the General Post Office without such Badge or Ticket upon the most vusible Part of their Cluathing, are desired to give Information thereof to the Passmaster General, that the Offenders may be profecuted according to Law; and for fuch Information they shall meet with all fitting Encouragement,
