On Saturday the 13 inftant, his Ex-cellency the Marquis del Freshois, Ambaffador Ex-traordinary from his Catholick Majefty, made. his publick Entry here, having been at Greenwich received and Complimented by the Right Honou-rable the Earl of Alesbury, and Sir Charles Cotterel, Matter of the Ceremonies, and brought thence in his Majeflies Barges to Tower-hill, where being Landed, he was faluted with the Great Guns, and conducted in His Majesties Coach through the City, being belides his own Coaches and Train, which were very Rich and Noble, aptended by a great number of Coaches with fix Horfes spiece, to the Lady Williams Houle, in Welfmidling, where his Excellency was again Complimented in His Ma-jesties name, by the Right Honourable Sir Thomas Clifford, Treasurer of His Majesties Houshold; in Her Majesties name, by Sir William Killegrew Her Majesties Vice-Chamberlain, and on the part of his Royal Highnels, by the Marquis of Blanguefort; His Excellency, having for three days together, been Honourably entertained there upon His Ma-jesties account; yesterday the 16 instant had his multick. Audience of their Mainline in the Bar publick, Audience of their Majesties in the Banquer-ing House, with the usual Ceremonies, having been conducted from the laid Lady Williams House by the Right Honourable the Earl of Sandwich, and Sir Charles Cotterel in His Majesties Coach, attended with a great. Train of other Coaches, with fix Horles apiece - after which his Excellency had Jikewife Audience of his Royal Highness in his own Apartment.

This day His Majesty was pleased to admit the Right, Honourable Henry Marquis of Worcester, Lord Prefident of the Council of Wales; Arthur Earlof Effex, whom His Majeffy declared he was fending into Ircland, as Lord Lieutenant of that Kingdom; Ihomas Vifcount Falconberg, Captain of His Majefties Band of Penfioners, and George Vifcount Hallifax. of His Majesties molt Honourable Privy Gouncil, who having severally had the usual Oaths administred to them, took their places at the Board accordingly.
