Hampton-Court, July 7.

HIS Majesty's Secretary of State, Sir John Hanbourn, Mr. James Sindick, and M. Conrade Widow Senator, had their private Audience of Leave of His Majesty, to which they were introduced by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell; Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

They had afterwards a private Audience of Leave of Her Majesty, to which they were introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Grantham Her Majesty's Lord Chamberlain, and conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies;

Who afterwards introduced them to private Audiences of Leave of his Royal Highness the Duke, of her Royal Highness the Princess Royal, and of their Royal Highnesses the Princesses Caroline, Mary, and Louisa.

Whitehall, July 10.

This Day their Majesties came from Hampton-Court to Hyde-Park, where the four Troops of Horse-Guards, viz. the first commanded by the Right Honourable Henry Lord Herbert, the second by the Right Honourable Algernon Earl of Hertford, the third by the Right Honourable George Earl of Cholmondeley, and the fourth by the Right Honourable Richard Lord Viscount Shannon; as also the two Troops of Horse Grenadier Guards, viz. the first commanded by the Honourable John Fanè, Esq; and the second by the Honourable Henry Berkeley, Esq; passed in Review before His Majesty, and made a very fine Appearance: After which, their Majesties returned to Hampton-Court.

Hague, July 20, N. S. On the 18th Instant the Count de Welderen and M. Silvius made a Report to the States General of their late Embassy in England, with which the States were entirely satisfied, and approved their Conduct. The Day following Count Welderen went to Guelders, he being one of the States of that Province. On the 18th Instant Sir Robert Sutton with his Lady, and

the Brigadier his Brother; arrived at Rotterdam in one of His Britannick Majesty's Yachts from London, and this Day they came hither. They will proceed in a Day or two, the Brigadier for Berlin, and Sir Robert with his Lady for Aix la Chapelle.
