THE Prince Regent of Nassau Siegen, has taken the Oath in the Council of State of this Republick as Colonel of a Regiment of Foot, in which he has also a Company. On the 21st Instant, Brigadier Sutton his Britannick Majesty's Envoy to Cassel, and Sir Robert Sutton, with the Countess of Sunderland (his Lady) and her Sister, went to Amsterdam; from whence the first is to proceed to Cassel, and the others to Aix la Chapelle and to Spaa, to make use of those Waters. The Baron d'Espaer, Governour of the Prince of Nassau-Friesland, is dangerously ill at Utrecht.

Paris, July 24, N. S. On Tuesday the 20th Instant Baron Penterridter died about 11 at Night at Soissons of a Plurisy and Fever, in the 50th Year of his Age. All the Foreign Ministers were invited to his Burial in the Cathedral Church of Soissons. The Ceremony of the Duke of Bourbon's Marriage with the young Princess of Hesse Rhinfeldt, was celebrated Yesterday at Chalons. Besides the Rejoycings to be made by the City of Paris at the Greve before the Town-House when the Queen is brought to Bed, there are great Preparations made for Fire-works to be played upon the River between the Pont Royal and the Pont Neuf. The Duke d'Aumont is made Colonel of a Regiment of Foot. On the 21st Instant the King reviewed the Four Troops of Horse Guards, and the Troop of Horse Grenadiers, at the Champ de Mars near Marly, from whence those Troops marched to Versailles and filed off in the Court before the Queen.
