**O**N the 26th Instant his Imperial Majesty viewed the Fortifications of our Citadel, and was saluted on his Entrance with the Discharge of 52 Pieces of Cannon which are mounted on the Walls. A Courier arrived here Yesterday from Soissons with an Account of the Death of Baron Penterridter, the Emperour's second Plenipotentiary at the Congress. M. Teichman, a Sea-Officer, who has quitted the Danish Service, is, amongst others, to accompany his Imperial Majesty in his Expedition to Trieste, where he has already been to visit that Port.

Paris, Aug. 14, N. S. Letters from Rome of the 22d past advise, that Cardinal Pignatelli Archbishop of Naples, was dangerously ill of a malignant Fever, and that it was probable, in case he died, that the Archbishop of Capua, Nephew to the Pope, would succeed him. The same Letters advise, that M. Rieux, the French Consul at Naples, died of the same Distemper eight Days after his Arrival there. On the 4th Instant the King hunted in the Wood of Boulogne, and afterwards supped at the Muette. On the 7th his Majesty took the Diversion of Shooting in the Park of Versailles. On the 8th about Sixty of the chief Nobility were admitted, for the first Time, into the Queen's Bedchamber, since her Lying-in. The Marquise d'Aubigny, Mother to the Dutchess de Noailles, died the 5th Instant. M. Sequier, Grandson to the late Chancellour of that Name, is made First President of the Parliament of Metz. The young Dutchess of Bourbon is come to Paris, and will go this Day to Versailles, in order to be presented To-morrow, for the first Time, to their most Christian Majesties.
