**T**HEIR Imperial Majesties, who went on the 3d Instant to Loiben, a Place about nine German Miles off, to hunt the Roe-buck, returned hither on the 5th. M. Bragadini, the Venetian Ambassadour, has had Orders to complain of some Violences which have been committed by a Detachment of the Emperour's Troops in the Territories of the Republick confining on Mantua, by turning the Course of Water, destroying the Dykes, and plundering several Houses. The Imperial Court have thought fit to disavow what has been done, and have writ to the Prince of Darmstadt the Governour of Mantua, to cause all Damages to be repaired out of Hand. The Express who brought the News of Baron Pentier's Death, set out last Night with full Powers for Baron Fonseca to succeed him as third Plenipotentiary. Count Windisgratz is preparing every Thing for his Journey to Soissons, and intends to set out much about the Time the Emperour goes for Trieste, which remains fixed to the 16th of this Month.

*Vienna, Aug. 14, N. S.* Letters from Constantinople of the 4th of last Month give an Account, that two Articles of the Peace between the Port and Esreff which had been delayed to be performed, had been lately put in Execution; viz. by the Restitution of all the Artillery taken by the latter from the former in a Victory he obtained over them, and by the Cession of the Province of Huveise (anciently Suza) to the Turks. That indeed the Basha of Bagdat was obliged to march an Army to take Possession of Huveise by Force, but as the Opposition he met with

proceeded from the Han Governour of the Province, who would not give it up, and not from Esreff, who performed his Part by sending the proper Orders, this Incident had made no Flaw in the Peace. Thus Esreff had secured himself against any further Disturbance from the Turks, but yet was said to be in a very uncertain State, being hated by the Persians, and having lost his chief Support, which is his own Country of Candahar; a Brother of the late Mirveiz having made himself Master of that Province, by which Means all Succour and Recruits from thence for Esreff's Army were cut off. Besides that Disappointment, Schach Tochmas, a Son of the late King of Persia, who had long led a debauched indolent Life, began to bestir himself, and was become a dangerous Antagonist, having got together a considerable Body of Troops, with which he was to march against Esreff, and not without Appearance of Success. At the same Time Tochmas had dispatched two Ambassadours, one to the Porte, and the other to the Czar, to engage those two Powers in his Interest. So that the Wars in Persia were yet far from being at an End. There had been for some Time a Rebellion among the Crim Tartars, headed by a Prince of their Royal Family called Dely Sultan, who had drawn together so large a Body of Men, that the Tartar Han was not strong enough to give him Battle: But as the Porte was sending Troops to support him, it was thought Dely Sultan must in a little Time be suppressed.

*Fontainebleau, Aug. 23, N. S.* On the 14th Instant the young Dutchess of Bourbon was presented to the King at Versailles by her Mother in Law, being accompanied by all the Princesses of the Family of Conde; the King saluted her Highness, and received her  
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and her Brother Prince Alexander in the most gracious Manner. After which she was conducted to the Queen's Apartment, attended by the same Princesses and the principal Persons of the Court, and after having had the like gracious Reception of her Majesty, she went to see the young Princesses their Majesties Children; she then returned to her Mother in Law's Apartment, and after taking some Refreshments, she went back to Paris. The King, who left Versailles on the 18th Instant, supped at Petitbourg, and arrived early the next Morning at Fontainebleau. The Queen will go to Paris about the 13th of next Month, to perform her Devotions at Notre Dame and St. Genevieve, and about the 16th her Majesty will come to Fontainebleau.
