Gratz, August 21, N. S.

ON the 16th Instant the Lord Waldegrave gave a magnificent Entertainment to Prince Eugene, Count Schonborn the Vice-Chancellor of the Empire, the Princes of Saxe Uberhausen, Leichtenstein, and several other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes. His Imperial Majesty began his Progress for Trieste between Five and Six the same Afternoon, and proposes to be absent from hence about six Weeks. His Imperial Majesty makes easy Journeys, and diverts himself with Shooting as he goes along, having killed 22 Stags the Day after he set out from hence: In his Way he is likewise to receive the Homage of the States of Carinthia, Carniola, and Goritia. Prince Eugene is gone for a few Days to Count Lingenheims, to take the Diversion of Hunting, and proposes to make several little Excursions in the Neighbourhood during the Emperour's Absence, but Gratz is to be his chief Place of Residence. Count Tarouca, the Portuguese Ambassadour, having received the King his Master's Orders to attend the Court, arrived here on the 13th Instant, and had an Audience of the Emperour the Day following.

Fontainebleau, Sept. 3, N. S. On Tuesday the 31st of August, N. S. Count Maffei, the Sardinian Ambassadour, received an Express with Advice, that the Queen of Sardinia died suddenly at Turin on the 26th in the Morning, upon which he immediately dispatched another Express to give the same Advice to this Court. M. de Maffei is expected here himself next Week, to notify the Death of that Queen in Form, and it is supposed that on the 12th the Court will go into the deepest Mourning upon this Occasion.

M. Galvao, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Portugal, having received a Letter from the King his Master to His Majesty, notifying the Death of the Infante of Portugal

Don Alexander, who died of the Small Pox the 2d Instant, N. S. in the 5th Year of his Age, presented the same to His Majesty at Hampton-Court on Sunday last at a private Audience, to which he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

He had afterwards a private Audience of Her Majesty upon the same Occasion, to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Grantham Her Majesty's Lord Chamberlain.

The Marquess d'Aix, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sardinia, having received from the King his Master Letters for their Majesties, notifying the Death of the Queen of Sardinia, who died at Turin the 26th Instant, N. S. after a few Hours Illness, attended their Majesties at Hampton-Court on Thursday last, in order to deliver the same, for which Purpose he had a private Audience of His Majesty, being introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and likewise a private Audience of Her Majesty, to whom he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of Grantham Lord Chamberlain to Her Majesty.

A Presentment of the Grand Jury for the County of Middlesex.

Middx. ss. WE the Grand Jury of and for the Body of the County of Middlesex, have observed with the utmost Indignation and Abhorrence, that a certain printed Paper, entitled, *Mist's Weekly Journal*, Numb. 175. *Saturday August 24, 1728*, hath been published and industriously dispersed in and about the said County, particularly in the Suburbs of the Cities of London and Westminster, wherein are contained under feigned Names and Representations, certain false, malicious, seditious, and treasonable Assertions, against the Title of our most gracious Sovereign Lord George the Second, our undoubted lawful and rightful King to the Crown of these Realms, and in Maintenance of the imaginary Title of an attainted abjured Pretender, insinuating, that the happy Settlement of the Succession to the Crown in the Protestant Line in His Majesty's Royal House, the great Security under God of our Religion, Laws and Liberties, which Settlement we are all engaged by our Oaths, Affections and Interest to support and defend, is an illegal Usurpation. In which Paper are also contained under the like feigned Names and Representations, the most false, malicious and scurrilous Reflexions, tending to scandalize and vilify His most Excellent Majesty's Sacred Person, Family and Government; to poison the Minds of his loyal and faithful Subjects with Jealousies and Distrusts concerning his wise and gentle Administration, and to alienate from His Majesty the Allegiance and Affections of His People, together with the highest and most groundless Reproaches upon the Person and Memory of our late most gracious Sovereign King George the First, of glorious Memory: We do therefore present the said printed Paper (one Copy whereof is hereunto annexed) as a false, infamous, scandalous, seditious, and treasonable Libel, written, printed and published in Contempt and against the Peace of our Sovereign Lord the King, his Crown and Dignity; and humbly

pray this Court to cause proper Proceedings to be had, in order to apprehend and bring to condign and exemplary Punishment all the Authors, Printers and Publishers thereof, by due Course of Law. This One and thirtieth Day of August, 1728.
