HIS Day Count Kinsky Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperour, had his first publick Audience of His Majesty, of Her Majesty, and the Royal Family. He was conducted to Court by Sir Clement Cottrell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies, in a leading Coach and Six Horses of His Majesty's.

His Majesty being seated under His State in the Privy Chamber, he was called in, and met at the Door by his Grace the Duke of Grafton Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Houshold, who placing himself on his Right Hand, as was the Master of the Ceremonies on his Left, they approached his Majesty, making three profound Reverences as usual. He then began his Speech in the German Language, delivering his Letter of Credence to His Majesty, who was pleased to answer his Compliment in English: Which ended, they afterwards retired backwards, making their Reverences in the same Manner as when

they approached His Majesty.

The Master of the Ceremonies afterwards conducted him to the Queen's Side, who was seated under Her State in Her Privy Chamber, in the same Manner as His Majesty was. He was met at the Door of the Room of Audience by the Right Honourable the Earl of Grantham Lord Chamberlain of Her Majefty's Houshold, and between him and the Master of the Ceremonies was conducted up to Her Majesty, when he made his Compliment in the German Language, and delivered his Letters; Her Majesty was pleased to answer him in English, and then they retired in the same Manner as from the Audience of

the King.

As he proceeded to both these Audiences through the Guard-Chambers both on the King's and Queen's Side, the Yeomen upon Duty stood to their Arms.

From thence he was conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies to their Royal Highnesses Apartment; his Royal Highness the Duke, her Royal Highness the Princess Royal, their Royal Highnesses the Princesses Caroline, Mary and Louisa, being all seated under the State; he was conducted up to them by Mr. Herault their Royal Highnelles Gentleman Usher, and the Master of the Ceremonies; to their Royal Highnesses he spoke in the German Language, and the Princes Royal answered his Compliment in English; afterwards he retired in the same Manner as from the foregoing Audiences.

In the Evening he defired the King's Coach might set up, and for Dispatch took his own

and returned to London.
