*Fontainebleau, Sept. 17, N. S.*

**O**N the 15th. Instant, his Excellency Mr. Walpole delivered to the most Christian King, His Britannick Majesty's Letter of Notification of the Death of the Duke of York, and the next Day this Court went into Mourning. On the 19th the Court goes into deep Mourning for the Death of the Queen of Sardinia. Mr. Walpole went on the 15th to Paris, in order to wait upon the Queen the next Day at Versailles, to deliver a like Letter of Notification to her most Christian Majesty, and another to the Dutchess Dowager of Orleans; and his Excellency is expected back to Day.

*Hague, Sept. 21, N. S.* The States of Holland and West-Friesland have disposed of several considerable Civil Employments, and of some Commissions in the Army, but the Place of Receiver-General in their Province has not yet been filled up. On the 17th Instant the Count de Golofkin, the Czar's Minister and Plenipotentiary here, presented a Memorial to the States General, by which he has taken Leave of them; and is to set out forthwith to return to Moscow. Count Zinzendorf arrived on the 19th Instant, in order to reside here as Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperour, in the Room of Count Conigseck, who will set out for Spain in the Month of November; to reside at Madrid as Ambassadour from his Imperial Majesty. The Elector Palatine is so well recovered, that he has been abroad several Times to take the Air; and the King of Poland is much better, though he still continues to take Remedies. M. Sylvius, one of the late Ambassadours from this State to the Court of Great Britain, is made Grand Bailiff and Ranger of the County of Brederode.

*moved four Cables Length farther to the Northward than they lay before. The Red Buoy of the Knowle lies with Goulston Old Steeple, just open to the Northward of a Clump of Houses, called by the Name of Tarviner's Houses, the said Steeple bearing North-West three Quarters West, and Corton Steeple South West. The Northernmost White Buoy of Corton-Sand lies with the Body of Goulston Old Steeple, just shut in with the Northernmost Part of Tarviner's Clump of Houses, the said Steeple bearing North West, and Corton Steeple South West and one Quarter South. The Southernmost White Buoy on the Hook of Corton Sand lies with Corton Steeple West, and Cortley Steeple half shut in with the South End of Lowestoft Town. The Black Buoy upon the South West End of the Ridge lies with Cortley Steeple open with the South End of Lowestoft Town about a Ship's Length, the said Steeple bearing South West and by West, and Goulston Old Steeple North West. At the Entrance of this Gatt, from the White Buoy to the Red Buoy, lies a Ridge of Sand in Breadth about a Ship's Length, where there is but three Fathom at Low Water; when over this Ridge there is five or six Fathom all the Way out from the inward White Buoy to the outward White Buoy, bears South South-East one Quarter East. From the Red Buoy of the Knowle to the Black Buoy on the South West End of the Ridge, bears South East. They that will sail through this Gatt must leave the two White Buoys upon the Starboard Side, and the Red Buoy and Black Buoy on the Larboard Side: The Distance from the first two Buoys to the two outermost Buoys, is about two Miles and a Half, Dated at Trinity-House, September 11, 1728.
