Fontainebleau, September 21, N. S.

THIS Day his most Christian Majesty goes to visit the Queen at Versailles. His Majesty travels in a Calash, accompanied by the Cardinal de Fleury; and several Relais of Horses are placed upon the Road: His Majesty will be absent but a short Time. On the 19th the Duke of Richmond left this Place, where he had been five or six Days, in his Way to Aubigny: His Grace was presented to the King, and hunted several Times with his Majesty. The Bishop of Angers is to make the Funeral Oration upon the Death of the Queen of Sardinia, when the Service that is preparing for that Princess shall be solemnized. The King has granted Letters of Nobility to the Son of M. Chirac, first Physician to the Duke of Orleans.

Windsor-Castle, September 12.

This Day Cossun Hojah, Envoy from the Government of Tripoly in Barbary, had his first publick Audience of His Majesty, of the Queen, and of the whole Royal Family, in the following Manner;

He and his Retinue came from London in the Morning; at Slough, near Windsor, Sir Clement Cottrell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies met him, with a leading Coach and six Horses of the King's, in which he went up to the Castle. At the Stair Foot, he was met by John Inglis, Esq; Marshal of the Ceremonies, who leading the Way up Stairs, the Envoy rested at an outer Room to wait His Majesty's Pleasure: As soon as the King was ready, his Grace the Duke of Grafton Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household, coming to the Door of the Privy Chamber, the Room of Audience, gave Notice to the Master of the Ceremonies,

who advertizing the Envoy, he entered the Room of Audience, the Lord Chamberlain going on his Right Hand, the Master of the Ceremonies on the Left. His Majesty was seated under his State, and covered, but was graciously pleased to move His Hat at every one of the Envoy's three Reverences; who being approached, began his Compliment to His Majesty in Arabick, at the End of which he presented his Letter of Credence, tied up in a Bag of Gold Brocade. Mr. Dadichi, the King's Interpreter for the Oriental Tongues, interpreted it to His Majesty in French; who was pleased to return a very gracious Answer in English; which the Interpreter repeated to the Envoy in his own Language: He then retired backwards making three profound Reverences. At the Door the Lord Chamberlain left him, and the Master of the Ceremonies conducted him to the Queen's Side, the Marshal of the Ceremonies leading the Way.

At the Door of the Privy Chamber, the Room of Audience on Her Majesty's Side, the Right Honourable the Earl of Grantham, Her Majesty's Lord Chamberlain, met him, and going on his Right, as the Master of the Ceremonies did on his Left Hand, they conducted him up to Her Majesty, making three profound Reverences at due Distances, as they advanced forwards to Her Majesty, who was seated under Her State. He then began his Compliment in Arabick, which was immediately interpreted in French by Mr. Dadichi, as before to His Majesty; and to which the Queen was pleased to return a most gracious Answer in English; the Interpreter having repeated it to him in Arabick, they retired as before from the Audience of His Majesty.

From thence the Master of the Ceremonies conducted him to their Royal Highnesses Apartment. At the Door of their Room of Audience
