Lisbonne, March 29.

He Sieur d' Aubeville, who is on his way hither in Quality of Envoye Extraordinary from the Court of France, is not yet arrived, which as is faid is the caufe why the Conde de Humaneq, Ambaffador from Spain, has not as yet had his publick Audience; the Minifters here being it leems defirous to know the errand of this Envoye before they have any publick conferences with this Ambaffador.

Yesterday the Dutch Resident went to Setubal to dispatch the Dutch Fleet which have laded Salt there; It is faid they will fail about the latter end of this week, and that because of the War they will take their course round by Scotland. We are told of an Order lately published here, that no vessel shall for the future enter into the Port of Setubal with Ballast of Sand, but onely with Ballast of Stones, upon pretence that they empty their Sand into the River, and by that means will in time choak up the Port; though it is thought there may be rather fome other designe in it.

Ratisbonne, April 12. This Dyet begins at length with more zeal then formerly, to proceed in the debate of the publick concerns of the Empire, and have refolved, that the Forces to be employed for the publick fecurity, shall be brought on Foot, with all the fpeed that may be.

We hear that the Prince of Furstenbergh is at present at the Elector of Bavaria's Court, with whom he hath had several conferences, though on what occasion is not certainly said. Monsieur de St. Geran is arrived at Franchfort, on his way home from the Elector of Brandenburghs Court at Berlin.

Madrid, April 13. Monficur de Ritz, Envoye from the Crown of Denmark, hath as we are told, lately received Orders from the King his Master, to take upon him the Character of Ambassador, to which end he is encreasing his Train, and making new Equipage. This Court hath with great satisfaction received the news of the Canonisation of Pope Pius the V. and Juan de Sebaqun, a Native of Old Castile; the former having been a Dominican Fryar, and the other a Agintin, both those Orders are at present busied about making great preparations on this occasion.

The Ministers of this Court have highly exprefsed their referitment of the Archbishop of Edeffa's having been omitted at the last promotion, in feveral Letters written to the Spanish Cardinals at Rome, which it is hoped may induce that Court to give this Crown speedy satisfaction in this matter.

Her Majefty hath appointed Don Baltafar de Fuen Mayor, to go Envoy Extraordinary to their most Christian Majesties, to condole on the occasion of the death of Little Madam of France. On Munday last went hence four Troops of horse, lately raised in these parts, towards S. Schaftian, where they are to embark for the Spanish Neatherlands.

From Murcia they write, that a great part of that City had been lately washed away by a suddain inundation, which had put the Inbabitants upon raif

ing of fome Works which may fecure them from the like dan gers for the future .

From Cadiq they tell us of the 3 inftant, that two days before a great Dutch ship of above 600 Tuns, had been chaced ashoar near S. Lucar by two Turks men of War,

Venice, April 15. Yefterday happened here an Earthquake, which lafted only for fome Minutes, without doing any great dammage hereabouts, though we cannot expect, but to hear of its having been more violent in other places. Captain General Morofini, continues fill in the hands of Juftice, chiefly at his own defire, till his Accompts concerning the Monies expended during the laft War at Candia are first cleared, which it is not doubted, but he will be able very fuddainly to do, to the fatisfaction off the Republick, and the vindication of his own Honour.

From Dalmatia they write, of some little diffatisfactions that have lately happened between Signior Morefini , Governor there for this State, and the Baffa of Boffina, on occasion of some incursi-ons the Turks have lately made into those Countries, but that complaints having been made thereof to the Bassa, he had at length promised to take care to prevent the like disorders for the future,, defiring General Morofini would do the fame, for that he faid, the Subjects of this Stare, had committed feveral Depredations in the Turkish Territories, and taken away fome numbers of Cattle, which had occafioned this like proceeding of the Turks. This week arrived here two of the Galleys of this State, in the ftead of which, the Senate hath ordered two new Galleys to be fent out of the Ar(cnal, for the reinforcement of their Fleet.

By feveral Veffels arrived from the Turkith Territories, we have fiill advice of their great preparations for War, which we begin daily more and more to apprehend, may be intended againft Hungary. Here is lately arrived the Duke of Nivers from Rome.

Hambrough, April 22. From Stockholme they tell us, that the Dutch Ambassada at that Court begins now openly to express his disfatisfaction at the little success he meets with in his Negociation there; It being faid that that Crown had finally declared it states his felf to the prejudice of the Interests of the States his Massers.

Here are at present several Spanish Officers to raise men for the service of those *Netherlands*,

Hambrough, Ditto 25. The King of Danemark is arrived within 20 miles of this place, on his way to Holftein, where he is to be prefent at the Affembly of the States of that Country. Yefferday palled this place Monfieur Rouffon, on his journey to Stockholme, whither he is, as we are told, going with the Ratification of the Treaty of Neutrality, lately concluded between his most Christian Majefty and that Crown. We have news of 3000 Men that are on their march from the Imperial Territories towards the Spanish Neatherlands

The Dutch Officers are very active in all these parts, for the railing of men, but we cannot heat of of ...any confiderable numbers that flock to them. The Swedes are transporting leveral thousand Men, as well for Pomeren as Bremen, and other their Territories in Germany, to be quartered there this Summer.

Wesel, April 23. The Inhabitants fly from all parts of the Countrey into the fortified places, upon the news of the approach of the forreign Troops, fo that there is at prefent great diffraction in these parts, which we have great cause to fear will still encrease among us, as our danger approaches nearer.

The Bishop of Munster is drawing his Forces towards the River Lip, and as is faid, may very fuddainly have an Army on Foot of 25000 meh.

The preparations for War as well at Dorftein as other places are very great. We are here in continu-

al appfehensions of being attacqued. Antwerp, April 25 Yesterday arrived here the Baron d'Iffola, the Imperial Minister, together with the Heer van Beuningen, on the part of the States General of the United Provinces, from the Hagues on their way to Bruffels, whither they go to confer, as is faid, with the Count de Monterey, concerning some affairs of great importance.

We are told that the Elector of Cologne, 25 Pfince of Liege, hath offered his molt Christian Majefty, all the conveniency that place can afford for his refidence during his stay in those parts, and that whilk he is there, the Caitle shall be commanded by whom his Majefty shall appoint.

Bruffels, April 26. On Friday last his Excellency the Count de Montercy went hence to Ter Veuren, where he met the Duke of Lorrain, with whom he continued in conference most part of the night; It is faid, that that Duke is at present, together with the Prince of Vaudemont, incognito, here in Town.

The most Christian King will certainly be the 2 of the next month at Charleroy, from whence he will foon march with his Army towards Liege; the report here is, that Maestricht may be the first place attacked, which they feem there very apprehensive of, and are accordingly using all endeavors for the putting things in a good pollure of defence.

Cologne, April 26. Several Passengers arrived here tell us, that all the French Troops quartered in this Electorate, are on their march towards Nuis; The Prince of Conde is laid to be on his way hither, in the head of a confiderable Army. The Bifhop of Straf. burgh together with the French Minister Monsieur Verjus is at prefent here in Town, they have lately fent feveral Expresses to the Court of France, with an account of the posture of things in these parts.

Maestricht, April 26. Several Spanish Soldiers at prefent belonging to this Garrison, having been lately out as is thought upon party, met at Tillen, about 9 miles from Liege, a French vessel going down the Meuse, defigned towards the Electorate of Cotogne with Provisions; this veffel the Spaniards would have Commanded to shore, having to that end discharged their Muskets at the persons on board her, and they returning the like falute, it occassoned an Allarme amongst the Countrey-people, who immediately came down in Arms, and took three of the Spaniards prisoners, whom they carried to Liege, but as we hear have fince releafed

From Wefel they write of a party of Horfe that had been lately fent out from thence, but were returned again without any other exploit, then burning a poor Villagers houle, and killing a French man whom they met in their way, he as they pretend refuling to take Quarter,

Hague, April 29. The Heer de Wit Ruwsert van Putten is gine down, accompanied with his Brotherthe Pentionary de Wit, to hasten our Maritine preparations. The States observing that notwithstanding the feveral Placaets to the contrary, the Inhabitants of these Provinces, as well Seamen as hers, daily in great numbers quit their Habitations, and retire into Forreign Service, have now published an other Placaet, as well for the calling home all luch of their Subjects, as are at present abroad, as the preventing those that are not yet gone, from entring into the Service of any Prince or State whatfoever, though it is very much feared here, that this Placaet will have little better effect, then the former have had.

His Highnels the Prince of Orange may now very luddainly, together with the Principal Officers of the Army go into the Field, most part of their Train and Baggage being already gone hence towards the Frontiers. The Declaration of War against His Majesty of Great Britain , and the most Chriflian King, is at prefent in the Prefs, and may in few days be made publick. Paris, April 30. The 27 instant the King parted

from S. Germains to Nunteuil, where his Majelty lodged that night, and the next day proceeded for Soiffonr, intending to pals thence for Laon, Marle, and Rocroy, and to Lor CHerleroy, where is appointed the general Rendezvous of the Kings Atmy. The-28 went hençe the Prince of Conde, accompanied by the Count de Guiéhe, Lieutenant General of his Army, and the Marquis de Perlan, directly for Sedan, where the Forces which are to compose the Army to be Commarded by the Prince, are in the mean time gathefing togethet, in order to their marching towards the Rhync. The Mareschals de Bellefonds, and Humieres are retifed from Court, as the Mareschal Grequi, who lately arrived there from Merz, hath likewise done, they being unwilling, as is faid, to receive Orders from the Mareschal Turenne, who Commands the Kings Army next under him, as his Majefty had ordered they fhould, in cale the Forces under the Command of the Prince of Conde, should happen to joyn upon any occasion with his. It is thought that the Duke of Duras, the Count of Schomberg, and Monfieur de Navaille may be appointed by his Majesty to scrve in the room of these three Mareschals. On Sunday last went hence a great many Waggons laden with very confiderable fums of Money towards the Army, for the payment of the Soldiery, and to be otherwife employed as there shall His Majefly before his departure, be occasion. declared his having made choice of the Sieur d' Alegre to be Lord Keeper of the Great Seal, who accordingly received the fame from the King.
