*Fontainebleau, November 8, N. S.*

**O**N the 5th Instant his most Christian Majesty was dressed for the first Time, and all the Court admitted to see him at Dinner; and Yesterday the Queen, accompanied by all the Court, went to the Parish Church to hear *Te Deum* sung upon the Occasion of the King's entire Recovery. The Archbishop of Vienne officiated, and the King's Chapel Musick performed the Service. This Day his Excellency Mr. Walpole goes from hence, to celebrate the King his Master's Birth-Day, at Paris, on the 10th Instant.

*Hague, Nov. 12.* On the 8th Instant an Express came in from Osnabrug, with an Account of the Elector of Cologne's being chosen on the 4th Bishop and Prince of that Country. On the 10th Instant the Voters of the Town of Leyden chose for their Burgo-Masters, M. Vanderberg, as President, M. Ruiſch, M. Paats, and M. van Zaanen. The States of Holland and West-Friesland are to meet again on the 17th Instant. On the 10th Instant N. S. being the Anniversary of His Britannick Majesty's Birth-Day, the Earl of Chesterfield His Majesty's Ambassadour Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, entertained at Dinner the foreign Ministers and the Persons of Distinction of this Republick, at Three very large Tables, placed in a great Room, which his Excellency had built for that Purpose; and Yesterday his Excellency gave a magnificent Ball and Supper to about 400 Persons: At the same Time two Fountains of Wine, adorned with Illuminations, were running for the Populace; and the Musick was playing till Three a-Clock this Morning.

*St. James's, November 2.*

This Morning the King and Queen, with His Royal Highness the Duke, and their

Royal Highnesses the Princesses, went to Hide Park; where the King's own Regiment of Dragoons, commanded by the Right Honourable the Lord Carpenter Lieutenant-General, passed in Review before His Majesty, and made a very fine Appearance.
