Vera Cruz, August 1.

THE Viceroy here having received a Cedula from the King of Spain, directing him to restore the Ships Goods and Effects belonging to the British South-Sea Company; Captain Whittington Williams was Yesterday put into Possession of the Ship Prince Frederick. The said Company's Snaws are ordered to be delivered also.

Cassel, Nov. 11. Yesterday being the Anniversary of His Britannick Majesty's Birth-Day, Brigadier Sutton, His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary here, gave a most magnificent Entertainment on the Occasion, at which the Landgrave, the Princes, Princesses, with all the General Officers, and Ladies of the Place, were present. It was followed afterwards by a Ball, which lasted till past Four in the Morning. During the whole Night his House was illuminated from Top to Bottom, with several Decorations upon the Windows suitable to the Occasion.

Paris, Nov. 10, N. S. This being His Britannick Majesty's Birth-Day, it was celebrated here by his Excellency Horatio Walpole, Esq; His Majesty's Ambassadour Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, who gave a magnificent Entertainment to a great Number of Persons of Quality of both Sexes, among whom were threescore English; and afterwards a Ball.

Fontainebleau, Nov. 12, N. S. His most Christian Majesty designs to leave this Place on this Day Sennight, and go to Versailles.

Dublin, October 31.

Yesterday being His Majesty's Birth-Day, the great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments on Duty, which were drawn out on Oxmantown-Green: There was a numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction at the Castle to compliment the Lords Justices, before whom a Song was performed; and at Night there was a Play given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
