THE Assembly of the States of Holland broke up on Wednesday last, and have appointed to meet again the 15th of this Month. The said States having passed a Resolution to raise a Supply of Twelve Hundred and Fifty Thousand Livres at two and an half per Cent. towards defraying the Charge of the current Services; People were so desirous to subscribe to this Loan, that it was presently filled, and considerable Premiums were given for Subscriptions.

Whereas several Gentlemen in the Commission of the Peace for the County of Middlesex and City and Liberty of Westminster, did, about six Years ago, by a voluntary Agreement among themselves, meet together for the suppressing of Gaming-Houses, which had then in great Measure the desired Effect; but since the Discontinuance of their Meetings the pernicious and enormous Practice of unlawful Gaming, even by Persons in mean Circumstances, is revived to a great Degree, the ill Consequences whereof have visibly appeared by the late frequency of Street-Robberies and other Disorders; the same Gentlemen being desirous to contribute their Endeavours towards the obtaining of those good Ends recommended in the Letters lately written, by His Majesty's Order, by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to the respective Chairmen of the Sessions of the Peace for the said County and City and Liberty, and in particular towards the suppressing of the growing Evil, which when formerly convened they made the Object of their Care; they have agreed to meet Weekly, or oftner, if it shall appear necessary, for that Purpose; and those Gentlemen who were then concerned are desired to attend such Meetings.
