B Y Letters from Dover we have advice, that the Dutch Fleet, about 80 fail fmall and great were riding yesterday evening in that Road with a very hard wind at N NE. where it is thought they will not continue long when once the wind comes westerly.

Ditto, May 8. Yefterday in the evening His Majefty attended by feveral principal perfons of His Court, returned hither from Portfmouth, as Her Majefty did that morning early from Dover.

Lisbanne, April 11. The fixth inftant the Conde d' Humanez, Ambaffador from the Crown of Spain, made his publick Entry here, and the fame day had Audience of the Prince Regent, in which Ceremony there happened it feems fome miftakes, which a little diffitisfied the Prince, though the matter hath been fince wholy accommodated. The fame day artived here the Sieur d' Aubeville, Envoy Extraordinary from his moft Chriftian Majefty; and had his Audience yefterday in the Morning, notwithftanding it, was Palme Sunday, which makes its think, that he has fome propolitions to make on the part of that Crown, of no fmall concern to us; it is.mot known how long he max continue here, the general opinion being, that his flay will be according to the faccefs he may meet with in his Negotiation at this Court. The Dutch Fleet of Merthait here, till fome men of War fhall arrive for their Convoy bome. The Corfairs of Sally have feveral fmall men of War abroad, and on much mify thief to our Trade.

chief to our Trade. Naples, April 19 Here now daily arrive veffels laden with Corn from Leghorne, and feveral other parts abroad, which had been bought up there by order of our Viceroy the Marquis d'Aftorgas ; though in the, mean time we have advice from Meffina, that those Inhabitants are in as great want as ever of this Provision, the reason of which they attribute to the want of care in their Magiltrates, which made them lately mutiny, and in that diforder, offer violence to fome of the principal perfons of that place, and pull their Houfes down to the ground,

pull their Houles, down to the ground; His Excellency baving given out Committions for the railing of two Regiments of Foot, the Leavies are accordingly making with all the diligence possible. They writing from Milat, for whole Service these Men are as is faid, intended, of the great want they have of these Recruits. For the reinforcing their feveral Garrifons. On Saturday laft arrived here from Rome the Prince Savelli, accompanied with feveral persons of guality. By whom we are told, that his Holiness had been interly extream III., infomuch, that he had been forced to defer giving Audience to the French Extraordinary Amballador, for eight or ten days, he having been all that time detained in his Bed, not without much danger.

It is faid here that his Holinefs to fatisfy the pretences of the Crowns of France and of Spain, hath affured as well the French Ambaffador as the Spanifit Cardinals, that the Bishop of Laon and the Archbishop of Edcsfa are the two Cardinals referved in Petto, and that he will very fuddainly declate them.

Madrid, April 27. Their Majesties have for fome days paft, been a little indifposed, which had hin, dred the Court from removing to the Buen Retie ro, as they defigned to have done on Sunday laft, but will now first expect their Majesties perfect re-covery, who begin to be pretty well again. The Prince of Montesarchio is lately gone hence by direction of the Queen Regent for Cadiz, in order, to the taking an accompt of fome Ships that are fitting ont there. On Munday last artived here an Express with Letters from the Count de Monterey, Governor of the Spanish Neatherlands; upon which here was immediately an Extraordinary Councel held, though the particulars of what this Express. brought, as yet we know not. Her Majefly hath lately conferred on Don Carlos Brifeno, (a perion of much worth, and who had ferved this Crown for leveral years in Flanders) the Title of Marquis de villa Nueua de las Torres, as well in confi-deration of his own Services, as in favor of the Marriage he hath lately contracted with Dona Ma-ria Ranquillo, Maid of Honor to the Queen. The Envoy from the Elector of Cologne, having conclu-, ded his Negotiation with far greater fatisfaction, then had been by some here expected, hath defired his dispatch, which is promised him in three or four days, so that he may be going hence on, his return home, about the later end of the next week.

The Ambaffadors at prefent refiding here from the Emperor and the Republick of Venice, doe both daily expect leave to be recalled from this, Court; The former having had fome confiderable employment lately bestowed upon him by the Emperor, which makes him the more defire to be at home in order to the taking possession of it. On Sunday last went hence towards Park, Don Balthagar de Fuen Mayor, in Quality of Envoy Extraordinary, to condole with their molt Christian Majestics, con-corning the death of little Madam of France. Don Pedro d'Arragon late Viceroy of Naples, is hot as. yet arrived at this Court, though daily expected. From Alicant of the II of this month they writes that there were then in that Port four great Dutch Merchas men, bound for Holland, but intended because, of the war to take their course round by Scotlands, The Duke de Einsapdina goes hence about the beginning of the next month for Cadiq, in order to his embarkation on the Flota for New Spain, where he is to fucceed in the Government of those Countreys; the Marquis de Mancera : We are told that Oredets have been lent hence to the Marquis d'Ar forgas Viceroy of Naples, to raife feveral Regiments of Infantry in that Kingdom, to be employed in Min lan, as well as for the fecurity of the Spanif Nether lands.

Venice April , 29. Here are at prefent two Dutch Ships Ships in Port, the Royal Defence of 500 Tun and 1 40 Guns, and the other the Peace of 48 Guns, this latter is lading Rice and Brimftone for Smirna and Scanderone. The Senate hath lately made choice of Signior Zani, to go their Ambafador to, the Crown of Spain, and he we are told, intends very fuddainly to fet forward on his journey thither. About the beginning of the next week, Signior Pietro Mocenigo, will certainly part hence on his Embally to Rome. The Iflands in the Architelago as likewile Zans, Corfu, and Ceffalonia, continue drance of all refolutions for the publick good; that in very great want of Corne, infomuch, that the the Emperor had offered them feven Regiments of people there begin to be reduced to much milery. From Rome they tell us, that his Holinefs was again pretty well, fince his late illnefs, to the great satisfaction of his relations, who cannot hear of his indifposition, without a sensible trouble, espe-cially seeing their concern in his health is so great : They farther tell us, that his Holinels had appointed a publick Confiftory to be held the first of the next Month , when he will, as is faid , declare the promotion, long fince made in Petto, of the Bishop of Laon, and the Archbishop of Ediffz; That Sig-nior Norli is preparing in order to his journey to France, he being appointed by His Holineis to refide as his Nuncio at that Court. All our advices. from the Port speak, of the great preparations that are there making; and of the particular care the Grand Visier takes for the carrying on the War, which it is feared, may break out this Summer; The report of attacking Poland, decreases daily, the Collacks in the Ukraine being, it is faid, not fo ready to submit themselves to the Port, as was at first thought, but that the Grand Signior had made offers of an accommodation to that Crown, which it is not doubted, but they will readily accept of, especially confidering the present posture of their affairs, so that the general conclusion seems to be, that these Forces are intended against Hungary.

Vienna, May 1. To morrow their Imperial Majeflies part hence for Laxemburgh, where they intend to fpend most of this Summer; all possible diligence is used for the carrying on our new Levies, and the rather, fince every day brings us some account of the nearer approach of th Tarkish Forces; From Belgrade they write, that there were arrived 20000 Turks, and that more Forces were daily expected there, fo that here is not at present the least discourse of fending any Troops towards the Rhyne, those that were intended that way, being now ordered to march forthwith towards Hungary The Forces of Moravia and Silefia are likewise on their march for the defence and fecurity of that Kingdom; it is faid that the Envoye which is at prefent here from the Crown of Smeden, hath affured the Emperor, that the King his Master is ready to enter into a Treaty with his Imperial Majefty concerning their affifting joyntly the Crown of Poland, in cafe it may be attacqued by the Turks . Count Shafgort is appointed to go Ambaffador to the faid Crown, to be present at the General Dyet, which is to be held there about the middle of the next month ; he is likewife, as is faid, to carry with him the remainder of the Queens portion that is yet unpaid.

Hambrough, May 3. The King of Denmark having been leveral days at Gluck stadt is tparted hence for Rensbourg, where it is thought he will not continue any time, but proceed on his return to Copenhagen, The Troops which have been railed in the Imperial Territories for the fervice of the Spanish Netherlands are arrived here, and accordingly embarked in order to their transportation to those Countreys. From

Westphalia we have advice, that the Forces of the Bilhop of Munker are on their march in a Body, 10wards the Frontiers of Holland; our Merchants in the mean time are endeavouring to withdraw their effcas out of those Provinces, at a time when the Inhabitants thereof are deprived of all Trade, and feem onely to converse with the continual fears and apprehensions of the approach of their enemies. Our Letters from Poland tell us, that the Factions are ftill very great in that Kingdom, to the great hin-Foot for their affiftance against the Turks.

Cologne, May 6 Here's lately arrived Prince Willem of Furstembergh from the Elector of Bavaria's Court at Munick, where it is said, he hath succes-fully concluded his Negotiation, that Elector having promised to assist our Elector with a confide-rable force, in case the Hollanders, not content with the Neutrality his Electoral Highness hath declared he will preferve in the present Conjuncture, shall attack any of his Territories, or diffurb the peace of his Countries. We are now in daily expectation to fee the Prince of Conde arrive with his Armies in these parts, we being certainly informed that those Forces are already on their march.

Paris, May 12. From Charleroy of the fixth infant they write, that the King arrived there the day before; That his Majesty had ordered a Body of 20000 Men, Commanded by the Marefhal Turenne, to march the Saturday after towards, Liege, his Majefly intending himfelf to follow the day after, with the Gross of the Army; From Sedan they tell us, that the Prince of Conde intended to part thence with his Army the 14 inftant; and that he had in the mean time distributed the Cavalry into feveral quarters, that they might continue there more at cafe, till the faid time appointed for, their march

Bruffels, May 13. We have advice here that on Saturday last Monsieur Louvoy marched from the French Camp with a flying Body of 5000 Horfe and Dragoons, towards the Meuse for the security of some Vessels that passed towards Liege laden with Ammunition and other Provisions for the Army that on Tuesday Mareschal Turenne likewise marche with 20000 Horfe and foot towards Liege, that the next day his most Christian Majesty followed with the Body of the Army, and that this night he is to encamp about Tongres, three Leagues and a balfe from Maestricht. Yesterday returned hither General Stourda from the French Camp, whither he was fent by his Excellency to Compliment the King upon his arrival into these parts, by whom he was very kindly received, and difmist with a Prefent to the value of 1000 l.

Antwerp, May 13. From Hliffing we have advice, that their men of War were gone out, though that none of them had their full numbers of Men the Admiral Bankaers wanting above a hundred of his compliment; That the States of that Province had refolved, that all the Inhabitants should bring in their Plate and Gold, to be Coyned as hath been faid, for the publick Service, for the doing of which, they that are now at home, are to have 14 days allowed them, and those that may hap-pen to be abroad a Month, the States at the fame time promising to give them two per Cent. till fuch time as the Peincipal shall be repaid, which it must be long ere they can expect, and in the mean time may fear, that confidering the prefent Conjuncture, the Interest will not be very punctually paid them.

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
