Paris, February 19, N. S.

ON the 16th Instant the Augustin Monks of the Place de Victoire; celebrated a great Festival in their Church, on Occasion of the late Discovery of the Body of St. Augustin. The Cardinal de Noailles assisted as Archbishop of Paris in the Afternoon; the Chapter of Notre Dame went thither in Procession; and in the Morning the Archbishop of Rouen and the Bishop of Toul performed the Offices. M. Portail de Montesson, formerly a Horse-Officer, Commander in the Orders of St. Lazare and Notre Dame de Mont Carmel, and Cousin to the first President of the Parliament of Paris, is made Governour of the Town and Citadel of Louviers.

Dublin Castle, February 3:

This Day the Lords Justices, together with several of the Nobility, Members of Parliament, &c. attended by the Battle-Ax-Guards, a Detachment of Dragoons, and another of Foot on Dublin Duty, repaired to perform the Ceremony of laying the first Stone of the new Parliament House, in the Body of which Stone was placed a Copper Plate, with the following Inscription engraved thereon, viz.
