The Cardinal de Noailles assisted as Archbishop of Paris in the Asternoon; the Chapter of Notre Dame went thither in Procession; and in the Morning the Archbishop of Rouen and the Bishop of Toul performed the Offices. M. Portail de Montesson, formerly a Horse-Officer, Commander in the Orders of St. Lazare and Notre Dame de Mont Carmel, and Cousin to the first President of the Parliament of Paris, is made Governour of the Town and Citadel of Louviers.
