Dresden, March 9, N. S.

ON the 2d Instant Mr. Woodward, Resident from the King of Great Britain, arrived here, and had Audience the next Day of the King of Poland.

Copenhagen, March 15, N. S. On the 2d Instant arrived here Mr. Titley, who is to have the Care of His Britannick Majesty's Affairs at this Court during the Absence of the Lord Glenorchy. On the 4th he had Audience of the King of Denmark, and presented his credential Letters to his Majesty. General Bothmar, His Britannick Majesty's Electoral Minister, died here on the 9th Instant of the Gout in his Stomach. The Frost continues here to such a Degree, that several Deferters have lately passed over to Sweden upon the Ice, and others are come from thence in the same Manner. Dr. Yonker, a Physician from Hall, is lately come hither for the Service of Prince Charles the King of Denmark's Brother, who is reduced to a very bad State of Health. His Danish Majesty is taking all possible Measures for the Reparation of the Damage done to this City by the late terrible Fire. A Dutchman, who proposes to make Brick in a cheaper and better Manner than usual, is agreed with for that Purpose; and in order to keep the Money as much as possible in the Kingdom, the Inhabitants here are to have the necessary Supplies of Stone from Holstein, and Timber from Norway, at a reasonable Price. The Lord Glenorchy is still here, but proposes to set out for England as soon as the Belts are passable.

WHEREAS Complaint hath been made to this Court, That great Numbers of loose and disorderly Persons do often assemble themselves at the Place and Times of Execution of the Condemned Malefactors, and that the proper Officers appointed to attend such Executions are frequently insulted and molested in the Performance of their Duty: And that the said Officers who are ordered to assist the Persons appointed by the Company of *Barbers and Surgeons* in carrying a Dead Body of the Malefactors to their Hall to be dissected, according to the Act of Parliament, for the Instruction of the Members of the said Company in the Science of Anatomy, are frequently abused and insulted, and are sometimes prevented from carrying away such Dead Body, as aforesaid. This Court does therefore order, That the Under-Sheriff of Middlesex, and the Officers of the two Compters, who are to attend to see the Execution performed, do take special Care to prevent any such Disturbances and Insults: And that they assist the Officers of the said Company of *Barbers and Surgeons* in carrying away the Dead Bodies to their Hall. And that if any Person or Persons do in any manner oppose or hinder the carrying away any such Body, That the said Officers do seize and apprehend such Person or Persons, and carry him or them before a Magistrate; to be dealt with according to Law. And if any Persons, to the Number of Twelve or more, shall obstruct or hinder the said Officers in their Duty, that then the Under-Sheriff of Middlesex shall read the Proclamation in the Act of the First of King George the First, to disperse such disorderly Persons. And if they continue together in such disorderly Manner for the Space of an Hour after such Proclamation, That then the said Officers do apprehend such Offenders, and carry them before some Magistrate, to be dealt with according to Law. And it is further ordered, That this Order be printed and published in some of the publick

News Papers, and affixed at Newgate, the Place of Execution, and other publick Places within this City and Liberties thereof.
