THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Charles Dalton, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Land-Tax, to be raised in Great-Britain for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Twenty Nine.

An Act for raising the Sum of One Million Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Pounds, by Sale of Annuities to the Bank of England after the Rate of Four Pounds per Centum per Annum, redeemable by Parliament, and for applying the Produce of the Sinking Fund.

An Act for making good the Loss occasioned by a Sum of Money being stolen out of His Majesty's Exchequer in the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Twenty Four.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for repairing the Roads leading from Cannalls Gate to the City of Litchfield, and from the said City to Stone, and from thence to the End of the County of Stafford, in the Post Road towards Chester, and also from the Town of Burton upon Trent to the said City of Litchfield, and from thence to Wood End and Ogley Hay, and also from the said City of Litchfield to High Bridge in the County of Stafford, and the County of the said City of Litchfield.

And to Five Private Bills.
