Paris, April 13, N. S. The Family of Orleans has with the King's Permission gone into Mourning for the Duke of Lorrain, notwithstanding that Prince's Death has not been yet notified to his most Christian Majesty. The last Letters from Marseilles advise, that M. Blondel, Intendant of the Gallies, was dead there suddenly. The Bishop of St. Brieux, Deputy for the Clergy of Brittany is arrived at Versailles. On the 5th Instant the Queen Dowager of Spain went in Ceremony to the Palais Royal, to compliment the Duke of Orleans upon his Marriage. The Marshal de Villeroy is indisposed.

On Easter Sunday the King and Queen, His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, their Royal Highness the three eldest Princesses, with several of the Bishops, and other Persons of Quality, received the Holy Sacrament in the Royal Chappel at St.

James's; the Communion Service being performed by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of London Dean of the Chappel: The Sermon was preached by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop. of Chester, in the Absence of his Grace the Archbishop of York Lord Almoner.

And whereas another Letter has since been received by the said Newnham, and wrote by the same Hand, demanding One Hundred Guineas, to be sent to Mr. John Harrison, at Mr. John Whitaker's, at the Black Boy in Goodman's Fields, threatning likwise to murder him the said Newnham, his Wise and Son, if the said Hundred Guineas were not sent to the aboucsaid Place on the 27th of the said Month of March last. Whoever shall discover the Writer of both or either of the said Letters, or the Person or Persons who sent, or contrived, or directed the sending of the said Letters, so as such Person or Persons may be convised thereof, shall upon such Cinvistion receive as a Reward the Sum of One Hundred Pounds of the said Mr. Newnham.
