Copenbagen, April 16, N.S.

OUNT Freytag, the Imperial Minister, took his Leave in a private Audience of his Danish Majesty on the 11th Instant. Two Ships are sitting out for Greenland, on which Coast there is a small Colony of Danes; and last Year a Ship was sent on Purpose to make further Discoveries in those Parts, where she has remained all Winter, and is now expected back again upon the opening of the Seas.

Paris, April 20, N. S. The French and Swifs Guards that are to do Duty at Compiegne began their March thither to Day; these two Regiments were reviewed Yesterday in the Plain des Sablons by his most Christian Majesty. Six Notaries are added by the Comptroller-General to those that were named formerly for the receiving and inspecting the Subscriptions for the Lottery of the Town-House. The Death of the Marquess de Canillac has given Occasion to a regular Promotion of the Officers in the Troop of the Black Musquetaires according to their several Degrees. The Duke de Chaulnes has resigned his Pension of 8000 Livres per Annum, upon his having the Government of Amiens. M. de Malvrieux succeeds the late M. Joncourt as Lieutenant-General of the Artillery at Strasbourg; and M. de Janery is made Commissary-Provincial, in the Place of M. Malvrieux. The Marquess de Gandelu has obtained the Reversion of a Pension of 8000 Livres, Part of the 20000 which his Father de Duke de Tremes enjoys at present. The said Marquess was married Yesterday at Beaumont to Mademoiselle de Tingry. It is reported that the Bisshop of Amiens is dead in his Diocese. The

Marquess de la Jarre, Captain of the Queen Dowager of Spain's Guards at Paris, has had an Apoplectick Fit, of which he is dangerously ill. The Princess de Carignan is indisposed. The Count de la Fayette has obtained a Troop in King Stanislaus's Regiment of Horse.

Hague, April 22, N. S. The States having passed a Resolution and Answer to a Memorial lately presented to them by M. Grys the Danish Resident, relating to certain Disserences between the Crown of Denmark and this Republick, have sent it to their Ministers in England and France to be communicated to those Courts. The Disserences in East-Friseland are not like to end so soon as was thought; the Prince, and the Commissioners for executing the Imperial Decree, not being satisfied with the Submission of the Town of Embden, in the Form that Submission was made. The Lord Glenorchy has fixed the 24th Instant for his Departure from hence for Helvoetssuys, there to imbark for England. The Great Pensionary is so ill of the Gout, that he keeps his Bed. It is advised from Vienna, that Count Schonborn, Vice-Chancellour of the Empire, was gone to Bamberg, thence to proceed to Wurtzbeurg, to support his Pretensions at the ensuing Election of a Bishop. The Duke of Lorrain was preparing to set out from the Imperial Court for Luneville.
