**O**N the 19th Instant the Marquess de Montboissier was received by his Majesty as Commander of the Black Mousquetaires, at the Head of that Troop, which attended his Majesty at the Review of the French and Swiss Guards on the Plain of Sablons. We have Advice from Malta, that on the 24th past a Maltese Ship, after a long and obstinate Fight, took the Gazelle, a Ship of Algiers of 46 Guns. Yesterday the King went to Compiègne: Baron Steinville was expected early in the Morning before the King's Departure, in order to notify the Death of the Duke of Lorraine; for which the Court will go into Mourning for six Weeks. The Review of the Horse Guards, the Gens d'Armes, the Light Horse, the Mousquetaires, and the Horse Grenadiers, is put off till the King's Return from Compiègne. The Duke de Lequigny, Son to the Duke de Chaulnes, has been received by the King as Commander of the Light Horse. The Comte de Rose's Son has obtained the Regiment of Armistat. His Excellency Mr. Walpole arrived here on the 18th Instant; as did his Excellency Mr. Stanhope on the 20th.

*Hague, April 26.* The Squadron of Twelve Men of War now equipping by this Republick, will be ready in a few Days to put to Sea; the Command of it is given to two Vice-Admirals, the first M. Sommelydyck, and the other M. Ockerse. It is intended for the Baltick, to protect the Commerce of the Dutch Subjects in those Parts.

Horse Races at Ipswich, in the County of Suffolk.

**O**NE Hundred Guineas, given by His Majesty, will be run for on Tuesday the 17th of June next, by any Horse Mare or Gelding, being no more than five Years old this Grafs, to carry nine Stone, the best of three Heats, each Heat being once round the two Mile Course. The Horses Mares or Geldings to be shewn and enter'd at the White-Horse in Ipswich, before Noon, on Monday the 16th of June, and at the same Time Certificates of their Age to be produced to the Bailiffs of Ipswich. And on Wednesday the 18th of June, Thirty Guineas will be run for by Galloways, to carry nine Stone the highest, and all under 14 Hand\* to be allowed Weight for Inches, to run the best of three Heats, each Heat being twice round the two Mile Course. To be shewn and enter'd at the White Horse in Ipswich, before Noon, on Tuesday the 17th of June, before the Bailiffs of Ipswich; but no Galloway shall be suffered to run who has won to the Value of One Hundred Pounds at any one Time by Way of Plate or Match. The Rules for Running are to be after the Manner of New-Market; and the Bailiffs of Ipswich to be Judges of the Races.

**W**hereas there is a Paragraph in His Majesty's Rules for the running for His Majesty's free Plates at New-Market and elsewhere, directing that (as many of the Riders
