N the 2d Instant the most Christian aing arrived from Compeigne at Verfailles, about Eight a Clock at Night. The Marquess de Monti is set out for his Embassy to the Court of Poland. On the 16th the General Affembly broke up, and His Majesty's High Commissioner appointed the next General Allembly to meet here on the Second Thurfday of May 1730.
