OUNT Kinsky, the Emperour's Envoy Extraordinary to the King of Great Britain, fet out from hence Yefterday, in order to attend His Majesty at Hanover. Admiral Sommelfdyk was to fail that Day from the Texel with Part of the Squadron under his Command for Portfinouth, where the Remainder are to joyn him from Rotterdam and other Ports.

Hanover, June 10, N. S. On Saturday laft, the 4th Inftant, the King arrived here about Noon, in perfect Health ; the Streets were crowded with Numbers of People, who gave all possible Demonstrations of their Loyalty Duty and Affection for His Majesty, and there was a triple Difcharge of the Cam-non from the Ramparts; at the Caffle there was a fplendid Appearance of the Ministers of State, and of the Officers and Perfons of Distinction, who were admitted to pay their Duty to His Majefty, and to express their Joy upon His Majefty's fafe Arrival. On Sunday the 5th, the King heard Divine Ser-vice in the Chapel of the Court; after which His Majefty admitted His Privy-Councellours; and made feveral Promotions among the General Officers of His Troops, and dilpofed of fome other Civil Employments in favour of two of His Chamberlains. Towards the Evening His Majefty went to Herrenhaulen. to fee the Houfe and the Gardens, and at His Return stayed in the Drawing-Room till Supper. On Monday the 6th, His Majefty

faw a French Play acted by His Comedians at the Theatre of the Court. On Tuefday the 7th, all the Gentlemen of the Court; as well as the Officers of the Guards, were prefented to His Majesty, who after Dinner went to take the Air in one of His Gardens at a little Distance from this Town, and at Night there was a Drawing-Room. On Wednef-day the 8th, His Majesty was present at the Exercise performed by all the Officers of His Foot-Guards. In the Afternoon the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, accompanied by General Diemar, arrived here.
