COUNT Kinsky, the Emperour's Envoy Extraordinary to the King of Great Britain, set out from hence Yesterday, in order to attend His Majesty at Hanover. Admiral Sommelsdyk was to sail that Day from the Texel with Part of the Squadron under his Command for Portsmouth, where the Remainder are to join him from Rotterdam and other Ports.

Hanover, June 10, N. S. On Saturday last, the 4th Instant, the King arrived here about Noon, in perfect Health; the Streets were crowded with Numbers of People, who gave all possible Demonstrations of their Loyalty Duty and Affection for His Majesty, and there was a triple Discharge of the Cannon from the Ramparts; at the Castle there was a splendid Appearance of the Ministers of State, and of the Officers and Persons of Distinction, who were admitted to pay their Duty to His Majesty, and to express their Joy upon His Majesty's safe Arrival. On Sunday the 5th, the King heard Divine Service in the Chapel of the Court; after which His Majesty admitted His Privy-Councillours; and made several Promotions among the General Officers of His Troops, and disposed of some other Civil Employments in favour of two of His Chamberlains. Towards the Evening His Majesty went to Herrenhausen to see the House and the Gardens, and at His Return stayed in the Drawing-Room till Supper. On Monday the 6th, His Majesty

saw a French Play acted by His Comedians at the Theatre of the Court. On Tuesday the 7th, all the Gentlemen of the Court; as well as the Officers of the Guards, were presented to His Majesty, who after Dinner went to take the Air in one of His Gardens at a little Distance from this Town, and at Night there was a Drawing-Room. On Wednesday the 8th, His Majesty was present at the Exercise performed by all the Officers of His Foot-Guards. In the Afternoon the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend, accompanied by General Diemar, arrived here.

Stamp-Office, June 6, 1729.

Whereas by a Clause in an Act of last Session of Parliament, to revive the Laws therein mentioned, It is enacted, That no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, from and after the 24th of June 1729, sell Brandy or other distilled Liquors by Retail, to be drank in his, her, or their House, or Houses, but such Persons only as shall be thereunto licensed and allowed, in the same Manner as common Alehouse Keepers; and every Person or Persons so selling Brandy or other distilled Liquors by Retail, as aforesaid, shall be subject to such Rules Penalties and Forfeitures, as common Alehouse Keepers now are for selling Drink without Licence. The Commissioners for managing His Majesty's Stamp Duties, to prevent the Retailers of Brandy or other distilled Liquors incurring the Penalty for selling such Liquors without Licence, do give this publick Notice.
