HE King, who continues to enjoy a perfect Health, has lately made feveral Promotions among & the Officers of his German Troops, whereof 18 Squadrons and 12 Battallions are to affemble shortly in the Neighbourhood of this City, in order to be reviewed by His Majesty. Last Saturday in the Afternoon His Majesty took the Air at Herrenhausen, and did the same the Day sollowing. Yesterday about Noon His Majesty removed from this City to Herrenhausen, where he intends to reside the rest of the Summer. He has taken up there the same Apartments the late King had; and besides His Majesty's Table, there are two other great Tables kept at Court. A great many Strangers are already arrived here to pay their Court to His Majesty, and amongst others, two young Counts of Ottinguen. Yesterday Count Dehn, who has resided some Time in England on the Part of the Duke of Brunswick-Wolfenbuttel, arrived here from London, and was introduced this Morning to the King at Herrenhausen. Brigadier Sutton having obtained His Majesty's Leave to make a Tour hither from Wolsembuttel, is expe &ed here to Night or to Morrow.

Whereas by a Clause in an Act of last Session of Parliament, to revive the Laws therein mentioned, It is enacted, That no Person or Persons whatsoever shill, from and after the 24th of June 1729, sell Brandy or other distilled Liquors by Retail, to be drank in his, her, or their House, or Houses, but such Persons only as skall be thereunto heensed and allowed, in the same Manner has common Alehouse Keepers; and every Person of Persons of selling Brandy or other distilled Liquors by Retaile, as aforesaid, shall be subject to such Rules Penalties and Forseitures, as common Alehouse Keepers now are for selling Drink without Licence. The Commissioners for managing His Majesty's Stamp Duties, to prevent the Resailers of Brandy or other distilled Liquors incurring the Penalty for Selling such Liquors without Licence, do give this publick Notice.
