**B**rigadier-General Sutton, who went lately to Wolfenbittel by the King's Order, returned hither the 21st Instant; as did the next Morning Count Dehn the Duke of Wolfenbittel's Minister, who had likewise been to make a Tour to his Court. The 22d being the Anniversary of the King's Inauguration, the same was celebrated here with great Solemnity and Splendor. In the Morning a Sermon suitable to the Occasion was preach'd before the Lord Townshend, by the Reverend Dr. Knipe, His Majesty's Chaplain, where all the English Gentlemen that are here, were present. After which his Lordship went to Herrenhausen, where the Court was very splendid and numerous, to compliment His Majesty on His Succession to the Throne. His Lordship gave on that Occasion a very noble Entertainment to Prince William of Hesse, to all the Foreign Ministers, and to a great many Persons of Distinction here. After Dinner his Lordship caused Plenty of Claret and Rhenish Wine to be given to the Populace, and Gold and Silver to be thrown out to them. Towards the Evening all the Ladies repaired to Herrenhausen, where there was a magnificent Ball, which lasted till One of the Clock the next Morning. On the 23d the Count of Waldeck, who is in the Emperour's Service, arrived here. As His Majesty intends to make a Progress in His German Dominions, and to see the Mines at the Hartz, Orders have been issued for repairing with all Diligence the Roads which His Majesty is to pass: However, the Time for His Majesty's setting out on this Progress is not yet fixed. On the 24th the King gave Audience at Herrenhausen to the Deputies of the States of Hoya, one of the Provinces of this Electorate; as also to the Deputies of the City of Bremen, who complimented His Majesty upon His Arrival in His German Dominions. The same Day Baron Stein, Minister to the Duke of Wolfenbittel, arrived here, and was presented in the Evening to His Majesty. On the 25th the King, attended by Prince William of Hesse, the Lord Viscount Townshend, and the whole Court, went to review the Squadron of His Life-Guards, consisting

of 150 Men: They were drawn up in three Ranks, through which His Majesty passed, and caused them afterwards to march off before Him, Man by Man; after which they formed again, and performed their Exercise both on Horseback and on Foot, in a very handsome Manner. The whole lasted till Noon, when His Majesty's returned to Herrenhausen. Yesterday arrived here M. de Wedderkop, on the Part of the Duke of Holstein, to compliment His Majesty, and 'tis said he will reside here during His Majesty's Stay. Mr. Hendel passed through this Place some Days ago, coming from Italy, and returning to England. Several Domesticks of M. de Broglie, the French Ambassadour, together with his Equipage, arrived here the other Day, and his Excellency himself is expected shortly.

Hanover, June 28, N. S. Baron Schleinitz, another of the Duke of Wolfenbittel's Ministers, who has resided for some Time at Soissons on the Part of the Duke his Master, arrived here on the 26th from Brunswick, and had the same Day an Audience of the King; and Yesterday M. de Liening and M. Eiben were also introduced to His Majesty, to compliment Him on His safe Arrival here, the one on the Part of the Prince of Anhalt Zerbst, and the other on the Part of the Dutchess Dowager of Holstein Eutin. The Count de la Lippe Buckebourg arrived here last Night.
