*Copenhagen, July 8, N. S.*

**T**HIS Day died his Royal Highness Prince Charles, Brother to the King of Denmark: He was a Prince remarkable for a generous charitable Disposition, was universally beloved here, and is very much lamented.

*Hanover, July 18. N. S.* Last Friday, the 15th Instant, his Majesty reviewed the three Regiments of Horse, viz. Launay's, commonly called the *Leib-Regiment*, Hasberg's, and Shoulenbourg's or Walter's. These three Regiments performed their Exercise both on Horseback and on Foot, and in the same Manner as the Dragoons had done the Day before; and after they had passed by the King on Foot and in half Divisions, they remounted and marched off before his Majesty in Squadrons. The same Day Baron Stein, one of the Ministers of the Duke of Wolfenbittel, returned hither from Brunswick, and with his Colleagues has since had several Conferences with the Lord Townshend, and with his Majesty's German Ministers. On Saturday the 16th came on the Review of four Regiments of Foot, viz. that of Sommerfeld, Druchtleben, Schwaan, and Wurm, with which his Majesty seemed perfectly well satisfied. In the Evening, Prince William and Prince George of Hesse took their Leave of the King, and set out that Night on their Return to Cassel. This Morning his Majesty went to review four other Regiments of Foot, viz. Melville's, Finck's, Behr's, and Campen's; and to Morrow the Review will finish with the two Regiments of Quernheim and Zastrow, and the two Battallions of Foot-Guards. The Lord Waldegrave, the King's Minister at the Court of Vienna, having obtained his Majesty's Leave to make a Tour hither, is expected in two or three Days.

*Paris, July 20.* Forty two Captives lately redeemed by the Missionaries de la Mercy, have been presented to their most Christian Majesties, and passed before them

in Procession at Versailles. The Prince de Soubize has since received them in a Body at a great Entertainment which he made for them at his House, and this Day they go in Procession to the Church of St. Eustache, as Yesterday they went to the Church of St. Sulpice, and the Day before to Notre Dame; in which three Processions they will have passed through the most frequented Streets of this City. Mademoiselle de Beaujolois is indisposed. The Duke de Coislen Bishop of Metz is very ill. The Marchioness de Croissy, Daughter-in-law to M. de Torcy, is brought to Bed of a Son.

*Hague, July 22.* M. de Gallieres, Minister of this Republick at the Diet of Ratisbon, who had been here for some Weeks by Leave from the States, set out the 14th Instant to return to his Station, with new Instructions from their High Mightinesses to support the Protestants, who in the Empire are under Persecution from some Roman Catholick Powers, as also to engage the Diet to support the Inhabitants of Embden against the Attempts of the Prince of East-Friesland. The Margrave of Baden Dourla, who arrived here on the 13th, was magnificently entertained at Dinner on the 15th by his Excellency the Earl of Chesterfield. On the 16th, he went to Haerlem, where he has a Country Seat, desigining to stay there till the Arrival of the Prince his Son, married to the Prince of Orange's Sister, and then go to Utrecht to make a Visit to the Prince of Orange. On the 20th died the Lady of Baron Dehn, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Brunswick-Wolfenbittel, to whom she left a considerable Sum of Money. Yesterday Count Sinzendorff, the Emperour's Envoy here, dispatch'd an Expres to Vienna, after having had the Day before a Conference with the States General upon the Affairs of East-Friesland, and particularly on the Amnesty granted by the Emperour to the People of that Country. A great Fire happened at Dort on the 15th, which intirely consumed the Store-Houses belonging to the States, and several other Houses near them.
