ON Friday the 19th Baron Schutz, Minister from the Duke of Wirtemberg, being arrived at Lunenburg, was introduced to his Majesty, to whom he delivered a Letter from the Duke his Master. On the 22d in the Morning his Majesty, attended by the Lord Townshend, Lord Waldegrave, General Diemar, Brigadier Sutton, and by a very great Number of other Persons of Distinction, took the Diversion of hunting the Stag in the adjoining Woods, and by Two returned hither to Dinner. Yesterday his Majesty, for the second Time, took the Diversion of Hunting in these Woods, and proposes on Saturday next, the 27th Instant, in the Morning, to set out for Zell. Last Night Brigadier Sutton set out from hence for Copenhagen. This Day M. Chavigny, his most Christian Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Dyet of Ratisbon, set out from hence for Zell, there to wait his Majesty's Arrival. The foreign Ministers remaining here, are M. Diemar, M. Schleinitz, M. Hopp, and M. Reichenbach.

Whereas as well by Prescription, as by several Charters, the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgeses of the Town of Cambridge are seized of Strubridge Fair, and empowered to make Orders and By-Laws for the governing of all Persons coming to and using any Business at the said Fair; and in pursuance thereof did theretofore make an Order for Three Pence to be taken for carrying each Passenger from the Town of Cambridge to the said Fair. And also for a Toll of Five Shillings to be paid for every Coach coming to the said Fair, which of late Years they have not received, in Consideration of the Expences of the Hackney Coachmen coming to the said Fair: But the Coachmen attending the said Fair having complained that the Allowance of Three Pence a Passenger was not sufficient; and Complaints having also been made of extravagant Demands made by the Coachmen in wet Seasons and in the Night. This is to give Notice, that to prevent such Inconveniencies, the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgeses of the Town of Cambridge, did, at a general common Day held the 16th of this Instant August, order, that every Coachman coming to the said Fair, shall, before he carries any Passengers to or from the said Fair be registered with the Mayor, for which they shall pay Six Pence, and no more. And that the Prices to be taken by every Coachman so registered for carrying of every Passenger from Cambridge to the said Fair, or from the said Fair to Cambridge, shall be Six Pence and no more in the Day Time, until Nine of the Clock at Night, and after Nine of the Clock at Night, shall, be one Shilling, and no more. And every Person who shall drive a Coach, Chaise or Chariot to or from the said Fair, before the same is registered, or shall ask or take from any Passengers more than the several Sums before limited, shall forfeit and pay to the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgeses of the said Town Forty Shillings, to be recovered in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster.

And whereas by Vertue of the said Powers another Order was made the 24th of August 1711, which is since established and ratified relating to the Stations appointed by the said Charters for the several Trades within the said Fair, whereby it is ordered, that no Person or Persons shall from henceforth sell, or offer to put to sale any Woollen Cloth, or any Apparel made of Wooll in any Booth or Booths within the said Fair, but only the Duddery, upon Pain that every one selling, or which shall offer to put to sale any such Woollen Cloth or Wares in any other Place within the said Fair, shall, for every Offence of that Kind, forfeit the Sum of Three Pounds, Six Shillings and Eight Pence of lawful Money of Great Britain to the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgeses of the said Town of Cambridge, to be recovered by Action of Debt at the Suit of the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgeses of the said Town.
