ON Saturday last the 27th in the Afternoon, his Majesty arrived at Zell from Ghorde, and rested there on Sunday. Yesterday Morning early the King left Zell, and having hunted two or three Hours in the Neighbourhood of that City, he returned to Herrenhausen, where his Majesty arrived about two a-Clock in the Afternoon in perfect Health. Last Night the Lord Townshend, Lord Waldegrave, General Diemar, and several other Persons of Distinction, returned hither from Zell.

Hague, Sept. 2, N. S. The great Pensionary is so well recovered of his late Fit of the Gout, that he is at present out of any Danger, but is still confined to his Bed. The Earl of Chesterfield having represented to the States General, the Proceedings of the King of Prussia, in drawing together a great Body of Troops on the Frontiers of his Britannick Majesty's Dominions in Germany, and summoned their High Mightinesses for their Assistance if it should be required, in Consequence of their Engagements and the strict Friendship and Union happily subsisting between his Majesty and them; their High Mightinesses have resolved to write a Letter to the King of Prussia, to dissuade him from all military Proceedings; and have also resolved to have a Body of Troops in Readiness to assist his Britannick Majesty. Accordingly they have named Eight Regiments of Foot, and Eleven of Horse and Dragoons, which are quartered near the Frontiers of the Dutchy of Cleves belonging to the King of Prussia, and near other Parts of Germany, to be ready to march at the first Notice, where his Majesty shall think requisite; and have also given Directions for more Forces to get ready, to be employed to assist his Majesty as Occasion shall require. We have Advice from Berlin, that M. de Sauveterre who has the Care of his most Christian Majesty's Affairs at that Court, had acquainted the King of Prussia's Ministers, that he was ordered to declare in the Name of the King his Master, that in case any Hostili-

ties should be attempted to the Disturbance of the Peace of the Circles of Lower Germany, his most Christian Majesty would be obliged as Guarantee of the Treaties of Westphalia, and by others since made, to concur and assist in the Measures which should be taken against such hostile Proceedings.

Kensington, August 26.

This Day M. Chammorel, Secretary from the most Christian King to this Court, was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to a private Audience of Her Majesty: To whom he notified the welcome News just brought to him by an Express, that last Sunday at Three a-Clock in the Morning her most Christian Majesty was safely delivered of a Dauphin, at Versailles; which Her Majesty received with Expressions of great Joy and Satisfaction. M. Chammorel has likewise had private Audiences of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, his Royal Highness the Duke, and their Royal Highnesses the Princesses, to make the like Notification to them.
