ON the 12th at Night M. de la Baune the French Minister's Entertainments for the Birth of the Dauphin, were concluded by a Supper and a Ball. This Day the Assembly of the States of the Province of Holland adjourned for some Weeks. M. Hop, one of their High Mightinesses Plenipotentiaries for the Congress at Soissons, has obtained Leave to return hither for two Months about his private Affairs. M. Assendelft, who has been some time appointed Resident of this Republick at Brussels, set out from hence the 11th Instant to repair thither. The same Day Baron Dehn set out for Wolfenbuttel, upon Advice of his Brother's being dangerously ill. Count Zinzendorf had a Conference on the 6th Instant with the Deputies of the States General, to complain of Force used by the Dutch Garrisons in the Auftrian Netherlands, to recover some of their Deserters who had taken Sanctuary in the Churches there. The States on their Part have often been obliged to complain to the Government of those Netherlands that such taking Sanctuary by their Deserters was permitted, desiring Redress. M. Bellanger, the Elector of Cologne's Secretary, arrived here some Days ago.

Kensington, October 11.

This being the Anniversary of their Majesties Coronation, there was a numerous and splendid Appearance at Court of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction. At Noon the Guns in St. James's Park and at the Tower were fired; and at

Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, Ringing of Bells, and all publick Demonstrations of Joy throughout London and Westminster.

On the 30th past the Chapter of Landaff elected the Reverend Dr. John Harris Bishop of that See, by Virtue of His Majesty's Congé d'Elire, in the Room of the Right Reverend Dr. Clavering translated to the Bishoprick of Peterborough.

WHEREAS it was published in the Coffee-House Morning Post of the 24th of September last, that a Gentleman well skill'd in the Management of a Theatre, is obtaining Letters Patents to erect one in Ayliffe-street in Goodmans-Fields, by Way of Subscription, and that the Undertaking meets with a general Approbation. And also by an Advertisement published in the Daily Post of the 30th of the same Month, it appears that only seven or eight Persons have applied to the Justices against erecting the said Theatre, but that there has been no Meeting about it. These are therefore to certify, that the erecting the said Theatre is so far from meeting with a general Approbation, that great Numbers of Gentlemen and substantial Merchants and Tradesmen residing in and near the said Street, have applied to His Majesty's Justices of the Peace acting for the Division of the Tower, at several Meetings appointed for that Purpose, and set forth to them the evil Consequences that will necessarily attend the carrying on such a Design. The Justices present at those Meetings were so thoroughly convinced, that the erecting the said Theatre so near several publick Offices, and the Thames, where so much Business is negotiated and carried on for the Support of Trade and Navigation, will draw away Tradesmens Servants and others from their lawful Callings, and corrupt

rupt their Manners, and also occasion great Numbers of loose, idle, and disorderly Persons, as Street Robbers, and common Night Walkers, so to infest the Streets, that it will be very dangerous for His Majesty's Subjects to pass the same, have already ordered Caveats to be entred in the proper Offices, to prevent the Gentlemen obtaining Letters Patents for erecting the said Theatre, and are resolved to the utmost of their Power, to shew their Disapprobation of the same, by doing every lawful Act they can to prevent so great a Mischief.
